Course Description

This course is an introduction to epistemology. We will consider fundamental questions about the nature, source, content, and limits of human knowledge, and our justification for thinking we have it. The questions addressed in the course may include: What can I truly know? What is the relation between knowledge and belief? When is belief justified? Can we defend our claims to knowledge against skeptics? The primary goal of the course is to acquaint you with central aspects of classical and contemporary epistemological inquiry and to equip you with the skills to engage in such inquiry.

As we move along, which readings we will be discussing will be announced in class and posted on Blackboard.

Course Requirements, Evaluation and Due Dates

- Two critical analyses, 500 words for each, each worth 10% of the total grade. *Ceteris paribus*, each analysis is due the immediate Monday following class discussion of the relevant material. Exact due dates and details will be announced in class and posted on Blackboard.
- In-class exam: March 9, worth 20% of the total grade
- Two papers: The first paper, 1000 words, is due February 23 and worth 20% of the total grade; second paper, 1500 words, is due April 17 and worth 30% of the total grade.
- Class participation will account for 10%.

There will NOT be a Registrar-scheduled final exam. No assignment is such that a passing grade on it is required to pass the course.
