Prerequisites

Philosophy 249 or 397 and 3 units in a course labelled Philosophy at the 300 level or above.

Philosophy 249 is described as follows: "An introduction to philosophy through discussion of morality, virtue and the role of morality in society".

Philosophy 397 is described as follows: "An intensive study of selected topics in value theory".

Course Information

Questions to be investigated will include: (a) whether there *are* or indeed *could be* procedures for figuring out what moral rights, duties, obligations we and others have in various situations; (b) whether such procedures, if they can be found, could appropriately be counted rational and sound; (c) what exactly is being claimed when moral rights, duties, obligations, and values are claimed to exist; (d) what has to be the case if such claims are to be counted valid. We will examine the various approaches in the literature to the task of providing systematic answers to the above metaethical questions.

Course Learning Outcomes

By the end of the course students

- should be aware of what issues are currently viewed as being fundamental to the discipline *Metaethics* as described above and should be able to state and critically engage with the arguments for and against the central theses of the various systematic approaches to the metaethical questions outlined above;
- should be familiar with and be aware of the limitations of the investigative tools currently being used in such metaethical inquiries;
- should have developed and refined their ability (i) to formulate explicit and precise analyses of the reasoning in academic papers in the field, such analyses setting out the *direction* of the reasoning, the steps in the reasoning, and the unstated but critical background assumptions of the reasoning in such papers, (ii) clearly and concisely to frame and state arguments both for and against philosophical theses, and (iii) to gain the kinds of skills in analysis, argumentation, and research that would be of value in law, government and business policy development and implementation.

Required and Recommended Readings:

The basic structuring of the course will be provided by selections from my *Lectures in Metaethics*. As we go along, these selections will be posted in the Content section of D2L.

The other readings for the course will consist of copyrighted class handouts, journal articles and book chapters: all will be available on the Content section of D2L.

In addition, several articles in The *Stanford Online Encyclopedia of Philosophy* [https://plato.stanford.edu/] may be useful at various points in the course.

Assignments, due dates, and grading

Assignments:

- 1. Weekly reading assignments will be set and announced ahead of time on D2L.
- 2. Two essays (about 1000 words maximum, excluding footnotes and bibliography) will be set. Details of what is wanted will be posted in the Content section of D2L.
- 3. A term paper (about 1300 words maximum, excluding footnotes and bibliography). Details of what is wanted will be posted in the Content section of D2L.
- 4. Readings for the essays and for the term paper will significantly overlap with the readings mentioned in 1 and will for the most part have been discussed in class beforehand.
- 5. There will be no registrar-scheduled final examination.
- 6. Assignments are to be uploaded as MS-Word files to the Dropbox in D2L.

Due-dates:

- Essay 1: February 12.
- Essay 2: March 12.
- Term Paper: April 23.

Grading

- 1. Ceteris paribus, the essays will be worth 25% and 35% respectively of the final grade.
- 2. *Ceteris paribus*, the term paper will be worth 40%.
- 3. Later virtue will be allowed to redeem earlier sin.
- 4. Except in very exceptional circumstances, and at the discretion of the instructor, a passing grade in the course will be received only if each of the essays and the term paper is submitted.
- 5. If an essay is submitted after the stated deadline, then it will receive at most a B+ and then only if submitted by 4pm of the day after the due date: it will receive at most a C+ if submitted by 4pm of the day after that, and so on.
- 6. Percentages will be computed using the numbers set by the University as equivalent to the letter grades.
