Land Acknowledgment

The University of Calgary resides upon the traditional territories of the people of the Treaty 7 region in Southern Alberta, which includes the Blackfoot Confederacy (comprising the Siksika, Piikani, and Kainai First Nations), the Tsuut'ina First Nation, and the Stoney Nakoda (including the Chiniki, Bearspaw, and Wesley First Nations). The City of Calgary is also home to Métis Nation of Alberta, Region III. The University of Calgary is situated on land adjacent to where the Bow River meets the Elbow River; the traditional Blackfoot name of this place is "Moh'kins'tsis", which we now call the City of Calgary.

ii' taa'poh'to'p, the Blackfoot name of the University of Calgary's <u>Indigenous Strategy</u>, was bestowed and transferred in ceremony by Kainai Elder Andy Black Water on June 21, 2017. The name signifies a place to rejuvenate and re-energize while on a journey. Traditionally, these places are recognized as safe, caring, restful – and offer renewed energy for an impending journey. In a traditional naming ceremony, transitioning into the new name is a journey of transformation towards self-actualization.

Course Description

In this course, we will evaluate competing analyses of the good life, where 'the good life' refers to a life that is intrinsically good for the person whose life it is. We will consider some of the following questions, among others: What makes a life intrinsically good for the person whose life it is? What is the relationship between the good life and the happy life? How does freedom contribute to the good life? Does a good life require meaning of a particular sort? How do desire and pleasure contribute to and/or detract from the value of a life?

Prerequisite

Prerequisite(s): 6 units in courses labelled Philosophy, of which, 3 units must be in History of Philosophy (Philosophy 301, 303, 305, 307, 309, 311, 401, 403, 405, 407, 408, 411, 505, 507) and 3 units must be at the 400 level or above.

Course Objectives and Learning Outcomes

Students will read and summarize the written work of authors on the topic of well-being/welfare/the good life in groups and in writing.

Students will evaluate the arguments of authors for cogency in groups and in writing.

Students will advance original/innovative arguments for their own positions in groups and in writing.

Students will work respectfully in groups, working to charitably understand the views of others, and contribute to an open, safe intellectual environment.
