COURSE INFORMATION

Contemporary epistemology has taken an "applied" turn, engaging with literature surrounding social media, propaganda, artificial intelligence, public engagement, and power dynamics. But all of these discussions reference developments at the core of abstract, theoretical epistemology. This course will trace the questions and distinctions that have animated foundational epistemological theorizing over the past 75 years, to provide a base of knowledge sufficient for fully grappling with the important real-world issues mainstream epistemology has started to be concerned with.

COURSE OBJECTIVES/LEARNING OUTCOMES

- Outline the fundamentals of an array of issues in epistemology
- Write a persuasive argumentative paper
- Engage in constructive dialogue with peers.

REQUIRED TEXTS

Selected survey articles from *Stanford Encyclopedia of Philosophy*, *Internet Encyclopedia of Philosophy*, and *Philosophy Compass*.

COURSE ASSESSMENT

- 6 **précis** (worth 25%): thought pieces inspired by and on the subject of the assigned reading of 1 (single-spaced) page max. Précis may be handed in only at the beginning of the class devoted to the relevant reading and you may hand in no more than one per class. Missing précis receive a zero. If it's clear you spent two minutes on it, the précis gets a C. Otherwise, it gets an A.
- A 20 minute, completely stress free, oral midterm exam (worth 25%), held in my office during the week of February 27th, at a mutually agreed upon time.
- A 20 minute, completely stress free, oral **final exam** (worth 25%), held in my office during the week of April 11th, at a mutually agreed upon time.
- A final paper (worth 25%) of 10-20 pages, due Tuesday, April 28th.

POLICY ON LATE ASSIGNMENTS

You get a no-questions-asked extension on one take-home assignment, if you clear it with me at least a day in advance of the due date. *Unexcused late assignments lose the equivalent of 1/3 full letter grade for each day late, to a maximum of the equivalent of 4 full letter grades.*Missing assignments receive a zero. Midterm exams are not accepted more than one week late.
