Course description: This course is an introduction to the study of Indigenous peoples in Canada with links to Indigenous peoples in other parts of the world. Students will be encouraged to see the Indigenous world through a set of multiple lenses and to develop a more multifaceted understanding of Indigenous societies, the issues that they are facing, how they are dealing with them and the relationship between Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples and societies.

Utilizing global, regional and local examples, the student will acquire a fundamental understanding of some of the main issues that affect Indigenous peoples in Canada and around the world. The course will explore Indigenous people's histories, world views and contemporary realities.

The course will incorporate a multi-disciplinary approach of study, including the frameworks of history, sociology, anthropology, economics, linguistics, political studies, cultural studies, critical theory, among others to examine and analyze the current issues, structures and processes of Indigenous life.

Topics to be discussed include:

- Indigenous Peoples, historical context and current issues
- Indigenous Cultural Identity and Representation
- Economic and Social Development Issues

COURSE OBJECTIVES

• To instill in the student an international orientation to Indigenous peoples and the challenges Indigenous peoples face.

- To increase the student's awareness of, understanding of, and respect for Indigenous worldviews and perspectives, knowledge, realities, experiences, and cultures from around the world.
- To introduce the student to ways of knowing that fall outside the western scientific precepts.
- To demonstrate insights about Indigenous realities from a multi-disciplinary approach (e.g., history, sociology, anthropology, political science, economics, and literature) to the field of Indigenous Studies.
- To give the student experience at critically thinking and analyzing Indigenous peoples' experiences within a historical and contemporary context.
- To develop in the student an understanding of colonialism, and the diverse and enduring impacts upon Indigenous people, and the commonalities it creates among Indigenous peoples
- To increase knowledge of the legacy of the colonial relationship between Indigenous and Settler societies
- To expand understanding of the concepts of Indigenous and de-colonization

CLASS STRUCTURE AND INSTRUCTION METHODS

The course draws from a mixture of Western and Indigenous knowledge. Methods include: short lectures, videos, class discussions, student presentations, and presentations by guest lecturers. The lectures provide the basic course material.

Class structure - March 16 - April 15 Group Presentations

Students are to access group presentations via the "Content" section on the course D2L site.

Note: Readings for the scheduled day need to be read **prior** to class.

The course syllabus and schedule **may be altered** throughout the term to accommodate emerging issues and events

Quiz #1 – In Class- 10% - January 27

We will be discussing many points of view, personal experiences, Indigenous cultures, and different ways of viewing societal structures. The quiz will consist of short answer questions based on readings, media presentations (film & audio), lectures and discussions. Coverage: all readings and class material to January 13-24

Quiz#2 - In class 10% - February 10

The quiz will consist of short answer questions based on readings, media presentations (film & audio), lectures and discussions. Coverage: all readings and class material January 28 – February 7

Quiz #3- Take Home 15 % - Due March 9 by midnight (11:59 p.m.).

The quiz will be an essay based on questions related to readings, media presentations (film & audio), lectures and discussions. Coverage: all readings and class material to March 8 Submission is via the digital Dropbox in the course's D2L site.

Group Research Project Presentation and Discussion Questions-20% collective grade – Due on the original date assigned for the presentation.

March 13 - April 8

The class will be given a list of topics to research and you may choose one and form a group based on your choice. You and your fellow group members are responsible for a research project that will focus on the development and presentation of a formal and in class oral presentation on your chosen topic. The presentation will examine a historical and/or contemporary issue/topic that is related to Indigenous peoples. Please ensure that your topic incorporates the course objectives. You will be required to research and develop a forty-five-minute seminar/ lesson which will also include questions. The completed presentation must include audio of each member and their section in the project may be a power point, web project, art piece or any other appropriate presentational approach. Reference materials should be incorporated in the presentation utilizing APA format.

Please utilize the same font throughout the presentation.

The presentation must critically examine and analyze an issue facing Indigenous people and explore the impact on them from a historical and contemporary perspective. (e.g. colonization, globalization, Indigenous Rights)

You and your group members will need to discuss your project with me by February 4

You and your group members will be responsible for developing and providing to the instructor three discussion questions and a thorough and accurate response to the questions.

The presentation requires at least **6** references which must be from academic sources. Reference materials should be incorporated in the presentation and synopsis utilizing APA or MLA format.

Please provide the instructor with a digital copy of presentation materials and questions/answers via the course D2L dropbox.

Individual Contribution to the Group Research project and class presentation- 20%

Students will be assessed utilizing the same rubric as the group contribution and is based on their portion of the in-class group presentation.

Students will write a short, **3-4**-page paper summarizing what the individual student learned from their research and how this analysis contributed to and linked to the overall group presentation. The intent of the paper is to reflect an understanding of the material the individual contributed to the group project and presentation.

Due on the original date assigned for the presentation.

Both group and individual performance are reflected in the total project grade

Final Exam – 25 % Exam via D2L- The exam will be long answer questions based on the group presentations. All group presentations can be found in the "content" section of the course's D2L site.

Coverage: all group presentations

Exam time length – 3 hours

Access is via the "Quizzes" in the course's D2L site - April 25 9:00am. - April 27 4:00 pm.

Late Penalties:

Papers received after midnight of the due date will be considered 'late', thereafter, students will lose 2 marks per day. Please refer also to the policies on deferring term work on this outline and in D2L.

IMPORTANT POLICIES AND INFORMATION

Supporting Documentation and the Use of a Statutory Declaration

As stated in the University Calendar:

Students may be asked to provide supporting documentation for an exemption/special request. This may include, but is not limited to, a prolonged absence from a course where participation is required, a missed course assessment, a deferred examination, or an appeal. Students are encouraged to submit documentation that will support their situation. Supporting documentation may be dependent on the reason noted in their personal statement/explanation provided to explain their situation. This could be medical certificate/documentation, references, police reports, invitation letter, third party letter of support or a statutory declaration etc. The decision to provide supporting documentation that best suits the situation is at the discretion of the student. Students cannot be required to provide specific supporting documentation, such as a medical note.

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Students can make a Statutory Declaration as their supporting documentation (available at ucalgary.ca/registrar). This requires students to make a declaration in the presence of a Commissioner for Oaths. It demonstrates the importance of honest and accurate information provided and is a legally binding declaration. Several registered Commissioners for Oaths are available to students at no charge, on campus. For a list of locations to access a Commissioners for Oaths, visit ucalgary.ca/registrar).

Falsification of any supporting documentation will be taken very seriously and may result in disciplinary action through the Academic Discipline regulations or the Student Non-Academic Misconduct policy.

Please note that while the form of supporting documentation provided is at the discretion of the student, the instructor has the discretion not to accept the supporting documentation if it does not corroborate the reason(s) given for the exemption/special request.

Absence from a Mid-term Examination:

Students who are absent from a scheduled term test or quiz for legitimate reasons are responsible for contacting the instructor via email within 48 hours of the missed test to discuss alternative arrangements. A copy of this email may be requested as proof of the attempt to contact the instructor. Any student who fails to do so forfeits the right to a makeup test.

Deferral of a Final Examination:

Deferral of a final examination can be granted for reasons of illness, domestic affliction, and unforeseen circumstances, as well as to those with three (3) final exams scheduled within a 24-hour period. Deferred final exams will not be granted to those who sit the exam, who have made travel arrangements that conflict with their exam, or who have misread the examination timetable. The decision to allow a deferred final exam rests not with the instructor but with Enrolment Services. Instructors should, however, be notified if you will be absent during the examination. Appeals:

If a student has a concern about the course or a grade they have been assigned, they must first discuss their concerns with the instructor. If this does not resolve the matter, the student then proceed with an academic appeal. The first step in an academic appeal is to set up a meeting with the Department Head. Appeals must be requested within 15 days of receipt of the graded assignment.

Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy (FOIP):
