COURSE DESCRIPTION:

A political analysis of how selected works of literature from antiquity until very recently articulate visions of order and disorder.

Because (1) this is a block course and (2) a seminar that relies on Zoom technology for participants, students need to be aware of some additional aspects of the course. First, as a seminar, students are expected to participate in discussions and to be responsible for leading two discussions each. We will formalize these assignments during the first part of the Monday class. To enable things to go smoothly two things are required <u>prior</u> to the first class: (1) that everyone be sufficiently familiar with the assigned material that they can formulate their initial preferences for acting as seminar leader, and (2) that they email me their preferences by January 2, 2021 so I can draw up a preliminary schedule before the first class and send it to everyone by Monday.

REQUIRED TECHNOLOGY:

Computer with reliable Internet connection and capability to participate in Zoom meetings with web cameras for video presentations. After the Block course is completed. Office hours will be conducted over the phone.

COURSE OBJECTIVES & LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Upon completion of the course, students will understand the place of literature in the human search for political, economic, social, and personal meaning. Works of literature are much broader in their significance than the conventional approaches to "arts and letters" tend to emphasize. In addition to being a great poet, for example, Shakespeare was also a great political philosopher. We will read several literary works, chiefly plays, with an eye to examining their political significance rather than simply their literary merit.

WRITING STATEMENT:

Written assignments are often required in Political Science courses, including this one, and the quality of writing skills, including but not limited to such elements as grammar, punctuation, sentence structure, clarity, citation, and organization, will be taken into account in the determination of grades. Students are encouraged to make use of the services offered through Writing Support Services in the Student Success Centre (3rd floor of the Taylor Family Digital Library) or at http://www.ucalgary.ca/ssc/writing-support.

ASSIGNMENT(S)/PAPERS:

Each student will be responsible for leading two discussions. They can then submit a written report, based on the discussion and any other research, not to exceed 10-12 pages. The written work should be handed in within a few weeks of the oral presentation as an email attachment. The very last day to turn in your written reports is April 15, 2021.

PARTICIPATION:

Students will be graded on their participation in discussions. They are expected to have read and thought about the assigned readings and, if they are so inclined, to read critical analysis of the texts. Because 30% of your grade must be available to you the day prior to the withdrawal deadline

(in this course, January 7), I will send you an email indicating the grade you have received for the participation component.

MID-TERM EXAMINATION:

There is no mid-term examination.

FINAL EXAMINATION:

The final exam is a take-home exam and will consist in an essay that gives the students an opportunity to synthesize the material covered in the course. It will be available on January 8, 2021 and is due April 15, 2021.

LATE PENALTIES:

Unless students have a rational explanation such as a medical problem or a genuine emergency, the late penalty for handing in the essay/research paper is 5% a week.

INSTRUCTOR GUIDELINES:

Students requiring assistance are encouraged to speak to the instructor during class or after class. Email is also a common form of communication but it is not always as effective a way of answering student questions as a conversation.

Students are welcome to use laptops and other electronic note-taking devices in this course.

IMPORTANT POLICIES AND INFORMATION

Supporting Documentation and the Use of a Statutory Declaration

As stated in the University Calendar:

Students may be asked to provide supporting documentation for an exemption/special request. This may include, but is not limited to, a prolonged absence from a course where participation is required, a missed course assessment, a deferred examination, or an appeal. Students are encouraged to submit documentation that will support their situation. Supporting documentation may be dependent on the reason noted in their personal statement/explanation provided to explain their situation. This could be medical certificate/documentation, references, police reports, invitation letter, third party letter of support or a statutory declaration etc. The decision to provide supporting documentation that best suits the situation is at the

discretion of the student. Students cannot be required to provide specific supporting documentation, such as a medical note.

Students can make a Statutory Declaration as their supporting documentation (available at <u>ucalgary.ca/registrar</u>). This requires students to make a declaration in the presence of a Commissioner for Oaths. It demonstrates the importance of honest and accurate information provided and is a legally binding declaration. Falsification of any supporting documentation will be taken very seriously and may result in disciplinary action through the Academic Discipline regulations or the Student Non-Academic Misconduct policy.

Absence From a Mid-term Examination

Students who are absent from a scheduled term test or quiz for legitimate reasons are responsible for contacting the instructor via email within 48 hours of the missed test to discuss alternative arrangements. Deferral of a Final Examination

Deferral of a final examination can be granted for reasons of illness, domestic affliction, and unforeseen circumstances, as well as to those with three (3) final exams scheduled within a 24-hour period. Deferred final exams will not be granted to those who sit the exam, who have made travel arrangements that conflict with their exam, or who have misread the examination timetable. The decision to allow a deferred final exam rests not with the instructor but with Enrolment Services. Instructors should, however, be notified if you will be absent during the examination.
