COURSE DESCRIPTION AND LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Political Science 590 is a seminar course that allows Honours students to explore central questions and research methods that animate political science. On successful completion of the course, students should

- Be familiar with major themes and questions in the study of politics
- Be able to describe the major research methods used in political science
- Have practiced reading a large body of literature for academic comprehension
- Become proficient in building research projects that meld research methods and substantive questions in political science
- Take the opportunity to complete an initial draft of their Honours Thesis

Thoughtful and engaged participation is the central requirement for success in the course. This includes being prepared and willing to engage in class discussions and to complete joint tasks and individual assignments in a timely manner. This will maximize your learning outcomes and those of your fellow students.

Political Science 590 is reserved for fourth-year Honours students in Political Science and is complementary to Political Science 591 (Honours Thesis). Together, they form the capstone to the Honours Program. You must achieve GPA of at least 3.4 (B+) in Political Science 590 to move on to Political Science 591 and maintain this to graduate with an Honours degree. Those who graduate with a 3.6 or greater GPA are granted a First-Class Honours Degree.

Web Sites

Whereas most books and journal articles available through the University of Calgary library will have passed many rigorous tests of their scholarship and veracity, this is not the case for websites, which can be published with little or no checking of their content.

ASSIGNMENTS

This course revolves around student engagement in responding to and discussing the readings and efforts to assist each other with the research projects that are submitted for grading. Your work should be made available to your colleagues at least 24 hours before class. All assignments to be submitted electronically in a readable Word or PDF file. You must complete all assignments to pass this course.

1. Research Proposal (30% of Final grade)

- a. Research Questions due September 12th(P/F) Share with the class and instructor a list of 3 possible research questions around which you will develop your proposal.
- **b.** Literature Review due September 19th (P/F) Share with the class and instructor a literature review of at least 750 words but no more than 1500 words that describes the main themes in the study of your chosen research question.
- c. Explanatory Model due September 19th (P/F) Share with the class and instructor an explanatory theory or model that captures the central concern of your chosen research question, including a graphical representation of the model.
- **d.** Research Method and Data Sources due September 26th (P/F) Share with the class and instructor a research method and the type of evidence or data and sources required to test your explanatory theory or model.
- e. Research Proposal due October 2nd, 2022 (30%) for October 3rd Class Share with the class and instructor a descriptive outline of your research question, explanatory model, literature review, research method, data or evidence and its sources in no more than 2000 words, excluding bibliography.

2. Open Book In-Class Quiz, September 26th (10%)

An open book, a 40 minute in-class exam covering the material from each of the chapters of the Toshkov text and the course notes.

3. Short Research Proposals due October 17th (10% of final grade)

Share with the class and instructor a research design of less than 750 words (excluding bibliography) that develops a research question drawn from one of your research-reading responses and unrelated to your major research proposal and provide a relevant short literature review (but a substantial bibliography) from which is drawn an explanatory model (including graphic), the description of a research method, and type and sources of evidence.

4. Research Essay due November 28th (40% of final grade)

In no more than 7,000 words (excluding bibliography) state your Honours research question, review the literature relevant to the question (substantive and methodological), provide a written and graphical research model connecting your dependent and independent variables, locating the question in the existing literature, and explaining the history and use of your research method. Identify and describe the evidence or data and method you will use to test your model or theory (referencing appropriate examples). You will present an outline of this paper to the class. Your submission should include the Honours Thesis Supervision form signed by a faculty

member indicating their willingness to supervise your Honours Thesis. All components are to be submitted to the D2L Dropbox by **21:00 HRS November 28**th.

5. Open Book In-Class Quiz (10% of final grade) December 5th.

An open book, 40 minute in-class exam covering the material from each of the major sections of the Goodin et al. text and research articles.

Late Penalties and Extensions

A penalty of 3% per day beginning the moment after the time at which an assignment is due will be applied to any late assignment.

Requests for extensions to any deadlines due to illness or similar reasons *must be made to the* instructor before the due date. Please keep an electronic backup of all your work to insure against loss or other difficulties.

Technology

To complete the course successfully, you will need access to a reliable internet connection, and an adequately equipped and secure computer. This includes, but is not limited to, programs required to make a computer fully functional such as a web browser, word processor, Zoom, and other software such as statistical packages (either free ware or provided through the University) that may be required to complete course projects.

The quality of your writing, including but not limited to such elements as grammar, punctuation, sentence structure, clarity, and organization, will be considered in assigning a grade to submitted work. A grading template covering these components will be used to provide feedback on major written assignments.
