Course description

This course provides a general introduction to the study of basic psychological processes. At the end of the course, you will be able to evaluate psychological information in accordance with the scientific method and will have introductory-level knowledge of:

- The diverse sub-fields of psychology, such as Developmental and Social Psychology, Intelligence, Motivation, Emotion, Personality, Stress, as well as Psychological Disorders and their Treatment.
- Understanding current psychological theories focusing on basic processes
- Basic concepts and terminology used in different areas of psychology

Lectures are intended to highlight and extend, rather than summarize, assigned text readings. You will benefit most from the posted lecture notes if you read the assigned book chapters **prior** to the corresponding lecture. Class PowerPoints as well as accompanying audio and/or video files will be made available on the course D2L site. The Power Points are provided to assist you in organizing and understanding the material and are not a substitute for the full lectures.


Course Format

Assessment Methods

Three on-line mid-term exams (Feb 1 [Ch. 4, 11], Mar 1 [Ch. 10, 12], Mar 24 [Ch. 13, 14]) and a final exam (date set by the Registrar: Apr 19-29 [Ch. 15, 16]) are scheduled. You will be allowed to start a mid-term exam any time within the scheduled 24-hour period, and from that point in time onwards you

will have **75 minutes** to complete it. If you experience an issue during the writing of any of the exams, which can include (but are not limited to) issues with technology, caregiving responsibilities, or distractions within a students' test-taking environment, please email me immediately so that I can arrange an alternate time for you to write the exam. I will try to regularly check my email throughout most of the day in case that you need help to deal with unexpected problems during the quiz. All are web-based, non-cumulative multiple-choice exams based on **both** textbook and lecture material (including films and other demonstrations). Not all exam material will be covered in class, and some exam material covered in the lectures will not be covered in the text, so paying attention to the (published) lectures is important for success in this course. Note that you are responsible for **all** assigned readings from the text even if the specific content has not been covered in lectures. Many exam questions will involve critical thinking, a skill you will be given practice developing in class, so again it's to your advantage to pay attention to the lectures.

Exams in this course are **open book**. For this course, an open book exam means that the use of class notes, the textbook and calculators is permitted.

The use of online resources is not permitted. Students may not communicate with others about course material or the exam either in person or electronically during exams.

Also three online assignments will be part of this course (with deadlines on Jan 27, Feb 18 and Mar 15), in total worth 12% of your Final Grade. They will be available on D2L under the "Assessments => quizzes" section. They have a firm deadline of 23:59 on the due date (also see the lecture schedule on the last page of this Course Outline), but they have no time restriction, so you can start working on it as soon as they have been made available. They will consist of any combination of multiple choice, fill-in-the-blank, and matching questions and are meant to give you an early opportunity to review the material for the upcoming quiz. The same rules apply as for the "open book" exams; your answers should reflect your personal knowledge and insight only. Late assignments will not be accepted without instructor approval.

Final Grade calculation

Your course grade will be computed as the average of your four exam scores (converted to a score of 84/100) PLUS the average of your three assignments (converted to a score of 12/100), PLUS your total Experiential Learning score (4%) (see section below).

In other words, **each exam is worth 21%** of your final mark, and **each assignment is worth 4%**: the "missing" 4 points can be earned via the Experiential-Learning/Article-Evaluation program (see below).

Course Credits for Research Participation

Experiential Learning / Article + Evaluation Course Component (4% of final grade)

This experiential-learning/article-evaluation component provides enriched learning opportunities in this introductory course. You can complete this component by participating in research studies (Option 1: Research Participation), by completing 1-page article evaluations from a designated list (Option 2: Article Evaluations), or by a combination of the two options. Thus, you will learn more about psychology by taking part in research studies and/or by reading and evaluating articles from a psychological perspective.

Option 1: Research Participation. Students can complete this course component by creating an account and participating in Departmentally approved research studies at https://ucalgary.sona-systems.com. Students earn **0.5% (0.5 credits) for each full 30 minutes of participation**. Each study will be followed by an educational debriefing experience. The demand for timeslots may exceed the supply in a given term. Thus, students are not guaranteed that there will be enough studies available to them to meet their credit requirements. Students should seek studies early in the term and should frequently check for open timeslots. **The last day to participate in research and allocate credits is Thursday, April 12, 2022** (i.e., you **must** have this **finalized before 11:59 pm** on that day).

Option 2: Article Evaluations. Students can complete this course component by reading and evaluating articles. Students earn 1% (1 credit) for each acceptable evaluation. Students can submit only one evaluation per due date (January 21, February 11, March 4, March 25, 2022). Again, closing time for each day is **11:59 pm**; late submissions will not be accepted. Please consult the D2L for this course for more information about this option.

Option 3: Combinations of Options 1 and 2. Students can complete this course component through any combination of Options 1 and 2 (e.g., 3% through Option 1 and 1% through Option 2, or vice versa). Given that each article evaluation counts for 1%, students who complete, for example, 2.5% through Option 1 would need to complete two evaluations to successfully complete all 4% of this course component. As mentioned under Option 2, students can only submit one article evaluation per due date, late submissions will not be accepted. Thus, students who opt to combine Options 1 and 2 must plan ahead carefully.

Department of Psychology Criteria for Letter Grades

Psychology professors use the following criteria when assigning letter grades:

A+ grade: *Exceptional Performance*. An A+ grade indicates near perfect performance on multiple choice and short answer exams. For research papers/essays/course projects/presentations, an A+ grade is awarded for exceptional work deserving of special recognition and is therefore not a common grade.

A, **A**- **Range**: *Excellent Performance*. Superior understanding of course material. Written work is very strong in terms of critical and original thinking, content, organization, and the expression of ideas, and demonstrates student's thorough knowledge of subject matter.

B Range: *Good Performance*. Above average understanding of course material. Written work shows evidence of critical thinking and attention to organization and editing but could be improved in form and/or content.

C Range: *Satisfactory Performance.* Adequate understanding of course material. Knowledge of basic concepts and terminology is demonstrated. Written work is satisfactory and meets essential requirements but could be improved significantly in form and content. Note: All prerequisites for courses offered by the Faculty of Arts must be met with a minimum grade of C-.

D range: *Marginally meets standards*. Minimal understanding of subject matter. Written work is marginally acceptable and meets basic requirements but requires substantial improvements in form and content. Student has not mastered course material at a level sufficient for advancement into more senior courses in the same or related subjects.

F grade: *Course standards not met.* Inadequate understanding of subject matter. Written work does not meet basic requirements. Student has not demonstrated knowledge of course material at a level sufficient for course credit.

As stated in the University Calendar, it is at the instructor's discretion to round off either upward or downward to determine a final grade when the average of term work and final examinations is between two letter grades. To determine final letter grades, *final* percentage grades will be rounded up to the nearest whole percentage (e.g., 89.50 % will be rounded up to 90% = A, but 89.49 % will be rounded down to 89% = A-).

Supporting Documentation

Students may be asked to provide supporting documentation for an exemption/special request. This may include, but is not limited to, a prolonged absence from a course where participation is required, a missed course assessment, a deferred examination, or an appeal. Students are encouraged to submit documentation that will support their situation. Supporting documentation may be dependent on the reason noted in their personal statement/explanation provided to explain their situation. This could be medical certificate/documentation, references, police reports, invitation letter, or a statutory declaration, etc. The decision to provide supporting documentation that best suits the situation is at the discretion of the student. Students cannot be required to provide specific supporting documentation, such as a medical note.

Students can make a Statutory Declaration as their supporting documentation (available at <u>ucalgary.ca/registrar</u>). This requires students to make a declaration in the presence of a Commissioner for Oaths. It demonstrates the importance of honest and accurate information provided and is a legally binding declaration. Several registered Commissioners for Oaths are available to students at no charge, on campus, please see <u>ucalgary.ca/registrar</u>.

Falsification of any supporting documentation will be taken very seriously and may result in disciplinary action through the Academic Discipline regulations or the Student Non-Academic Misconduct policy.

Absence from a Test/Exam

Makeup tests/exams are **NOT** an option without the approval of the instructor. Students who miss a test/exam have up to **48 hours** to contact the instructor to ask for a makeup test/exam. It's the instructor's discretion if they will allow a make-up exam. **Students who do not schedule a makeup**

test/exam with the instructor within this 48-hour period forfeit the right to a makeup test/exam. At the instructor's discretion, a makeup test/exam may differ significantly (in form and/or content) from a regularly scheduled test/exam. Once approved by the instructor a makeup test/exam must be written within 2 weeks of the missed test/exam on a day/time scheduled by the instructor. If a student cannot write their Final Exam on the date assigned by the Registrar's Office, they need to apply for a deferred exam <u>https://www.ucalgary.ca/registrar/exams/deferred-exams</u>.

Travel During Exams

Consistent with University regulations, students are expected to be available to write scheduled exams at any time during the official December and April examination periods. Requests to write a make-up exam because of conflicting travel plans (e.g., flight bookings) will NOT be considered by the department.
