Course Description:

This course examines key figures and ideas from the past in psychology and philosophy that have shaped and served as the foundations of present-day psychology. The focus will be mainly on the past two or three centuries, through the middle of the 20th century. Ideas will be evaluated in terms of their importance for today, but more so in their own historical context.

- 4. Final exam, Chapters 11-21, multiple choice and short/long essay (40%), date/time/place TBA by Registrar.

Grading/exam notes:

- 1. As stated in the University Calendar, it is at the instructor's discretion to **round off** either upward or downward to determine a final grade when the average of term work and final examinations is between two letter grades. To determine final letter grades, <u>final</u> percentage grades WILL be **rounded up or down to the nearest whole percentage** (i.e., 89.5% will be rounded up to 90%; 89.4% will be rounded down to 89%, etc.).
- 2. Students have the opportunity to increase their final grade by the addition of **bonus course credits** for their research participation in research projects that takes place before the deadline date (see the section below "Bonus Course Credits for Research Participation").

University of Calgary Curriculum Objectives:

With respect to acquiring the information presented in this course, you are encouraged to use creative and critical thinking, and to analyze problems by using abstract reasoning. Aside from having increased knowledge of the issues involved in the emergence of psychology as a discipline, it is anticipated that by the end of the course you will have increased your ability to think about historical, philosophical, and psychological issues in a more critical manner. It is also anticipated that this course will exercise your reasoning skills in an insightful and logical manner. It is my experience that students, who attend lectures, ask questions, and exercise critical thinking skills, relative to passive reading and/or rote memorization of the course information, tend to attain a better grade and report greater satisfaction from the course.

Reappraisal of Grades:

A student who feels that a piece of graded term work (term paper, essay, test, etc.) has been unfairly graded may have the work re-graded as follows. The student shall discuss the work with the instructor within fifteen (15) days of being notified about the mark or of the item's return to the class. If not satisfied, the student shall immediately take the matter to the Director of Undergraduate Studies in Psychology, who will arrange for a reassessment of the work within the next fifteen days. The reappraisal of term work may cause the grade to be raised, lowered, or to remain the same. If the student is not satisfied with the decision and wishes to appeal, the student shall address a letter of appeal to the Dean of the faculty offering the course within fifteen days of the unfavourable decision. In the letter, the student must clearly and fully state the decision being appealed, the grounds for appeal, and the remedies being sought, along with any special circumstances that warrant an appeal of the reappraisal. The student should include as much written documentation as possible.

Plagiarism and Other Academic Misconduct:

Intellectual honesty is the cornerstone of the development and acquisition of knowledge and requires that the contribution of others be acknowledged. Consequently, plagiarism or cheating on any assignment is regarded as an extremely serious academic offense. Plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Students should examine sections of the University Calendar that present a Statement of Intellectual Honesty and definitions and penalties associated with Plagiarism/Cheating/Other Academic Misconduct.

Academic Accommodation:

It is the student's responsibility to request academic accommodation. If you are a student with a disability who may require academic accommodation and **have not** registered with the Disability Resource Centre, please contact their office at 220-8237. If you are seeking academic accommodation, please notify your instructor no later than fourteen (14) days after the commencement of the course. Note that the instructor must approve any tape recordings of lectures.

Absence From A Test:

Make-up exams are <u>NOT</u> an option without an official University medical excuse. You must contact the instructor <u>before</u> the scheduled examination or you will have forfeited any right to make up the exam. In the case of such a <u>documented</u> situation (see the University Calendar), you must contact the instructor within 48 hours from the scheduled examination or you will have forfeited any right to make-up the exam. Make-up exams will be scheduled in one or two specific times put aside by the Psychology department. At the instructor's discretion, a make-up exam may differ significantly (in form and/or content) from a regularly scheduled exam. Except in extenuating circumstances (documented by an official University medical excuse), a make-up exam is written within two (2) weeks of the missed exam. A completed Physician/Counselor Statement will be required to confirm absence from a test for health reasons. The student will be required to pay any cost associated with the Physician Counselor Statement.

If you miss the <u>final</u> exam, you must contact the Registrar's office as soon as possible to apply for a deferred final exam; please let me know if you are applying for a deferred final. Please note that you MUST write the final on the scheduled date as there will be NO exceptions.

Getting in Touch:

If you have questions, concerns, etc., please raise them in class because typically others will have a similar concern. Otherwise, you can see me just before or just after class in the classroom, or you can come to my office (best to make a specific appointment), or enter a question anonymously on the web page for the course. Perhaps best, you can e-mail me at the e-mail address listed at the top of this outline.

I will be establishing an e-mail group for all of you who have UCS e-mail accounts (so be sure to set yours up), for example, to send out reading adjustments or answers to questions asked via e-mail. If you have a non-UCS e-mail address that you prefer, please e-mail me that alternative address, ASAP, and/or enable email to your UC account to be forwarded here (mid-page).

Bonus Course Credits for Research Participation:

Students in most psychology courses are eligible to participate in Departmentally approved research and earn credits toward their final grades. A maximum of two credits (2%) per course, including this course, may be applied to an individual's final grade.
