## Assessment Methods

## Course Outline Quiz & Midterm Check-In (1% of final grade)

After reading the course outline and attending the first class, students will have access to the 'Course Outline Quiz' on D2L (Assessments > Quizzes). The quiz is not timed and students can take this quiz an unlimited number of times before the due date (see table below).

Mid-way through the semester, students can complete the 'Midterm Check-In' via D2L (location/format TBA) for an automatic 0.5% towards the final grade (i.e., graded for completion rather than correctness) as long as it is submitted by the due date listed below. Note that the due dates for both the course outline quiz are final (i.e., no extensions), so complete them early.

## Chapter Questions (5% of final grade)

Chapters 1 thru 12 will have assigned questions that may be submitted anytime up until 11:59pm the day *after* the lecture in which we cover that chapter topic (e.g., Chapter 3 is covered in class on Tues. Sept.  $12^{th}$  and thus Chapter 3 questions may be submitted anytime before Wed. Sept.  $13^{th}$  at 11:59pm). You will have two attempts for each question and your 10 highest grades across the 12 chapters will count towards your final grade (0.5% x 10 = 5%). As with the Course Outline Quiz and Midterm Check-In, the due dates for these chapter questions are final.

#### In-Class Tests (45% of final grade)

There will be three in-class tests during this course. Tests 1 and 2 will be non-cumulative insofar as they will be limited to material covered since the previous exam. However, some of the concepts in this course are inherently cumulative in that they assume knowledge and understanding of material introduced earlier. Test 3 will be cumulative with an emphasis on material since Test 2. Tests in this course are closed book. The use of resources, including class notes, the textbook, online resources, and calculators is prohibited during the exams in this course. Students may not communicate with others about course material or the exam either in person or electronically during exams. Please see 'Absence From Test/Exam' for information on what to do if you are unable to attend a test.

**Group Test Review**: In the class following each test, students will, in small groups, complete the same test from the previous class again, submitting a single test for each group. For any student who wrote the original test AND whose group grade on the test is higher than their individual average, their final test score will be a weighted average of their individual score (90%) and their group score (10%). Any questions/concerns groups have about the test should be noted on the submitted group test for instructor review. In the week following, the instructor will hold a recorded zoom session to address all submitted questsions/concerns. If a student is unable to attend the test review class, there will be opportunity to review the test at other times (see D2L for information on these additional review sessions), but not to complete the test in a group and receive the 90-10 individual-group weighted average.

## Article Reflections (34% of final grade)

In this course, you will submit three article reflections, each worth 12% of your final grade (see table below for due dates). Note that in this course all assessment dates have been carefully set to space out the work evenly throughout the semester and, when applicable, to ensure that you receive your grades/feedback in time for it to be useful in future related assessments. Thus, it is in your best interest to plan to submit your article reflections before the due dates indicated in the table below. However, I understand that sometimes life events (e.g., technological issues, pet-/child-/family-care, mental/physical illness) can pose challenges to meeting academic deadlines. Thus, article reflections come with a built-in, automatic 1-week extension period. At the end of these extension periods, submissions will be accepted for an additional week after the end of the extension period, but penalized 5% per day elapsed after the extended deadline, including weekends/holidays. See table below for due dates, extension periods, and final submission deadlines. For all assessments in the course, if no submission is received by the last day to submit, you will receive a grade of zero for that assessment.

## Group Presentations (15% of final grade)

In the last three weeks of class (see class schedule), students will, in small groups, present on a topic from one of the three 'Social Psychology in Action' textbook sections. Students will be given the opportunity to indicate their preference for topics and presentation dates, and presentations will involve reviewing previous research and proposing a study to answer a novel research question. Presentations will be worth 12% of students final grade and completion of reflection forms for other presenters will be worth 3% of the final grade. Information on how to structure the presentations and how to submit feedback forms will be provided in class and on D2L. Additionally, one class will be set aside for groups to work on their presentations, and participation in this class will contribute 0.5% towards students final grade in the course.

## **Department of Psychology Criteria for Letter Grades**

Psychology course instructors use the following criteria when assigning letter grades: A+ grade: *Exceptional Performance*. An A+ grade indicates near perfect performance on multiple choice and short answer exams. For research papers/essays/course projects/presentations, an A+ grade is awarded for exceptional work deserving of special recognition and is therefore not a common grade.

A, A- Range: *Excellent Performance*. Superior understanding of course material. Written work is very strong in terms of critical and original thinking, content, organization, and the expression of ideas, and demonstrates student's thorough knowledge of subject matter.

B Range: *Good Performance*. Above average understanding of course material. Written work shows evidence of critical thinking and attention to organization and editing but could be improved in form and/or content.

C Range: *Satisfactory Performance*. Adequate understanding of course material. Knowledge of basic concepts and terminology is demonstrated. Written work is satisfactory and meets essential requirements but could be improved significantly in form and content. Note: All prerequisites for courses offered by the Faculty of Arts must be met with a minimum grade of C-.

D range: *Marginally meets standards*. Minimal understanding of subject matter. Written work is marginally acceptable and meets basic requirements but requires substantial improvements in form and content. Student has not mastered course material at a level sufficient for advancement into more senior courses in the same or related subjects.

F grade: *Course standards not met.* Inadequate understanding of subject matter. Written work does not meet basic requirements. Student has not demonstrated knowledge of course material at a level sufficient for course credit.

It is at the instructor's discretion to round off either upward or downward to determine a final grade when the average of term work and final examinations is between two letter grades. This makeup final, like the original, will be cumulative, but may or may not be administered in the same format. Details for the format of this makeup final will be posted within 48 hours after the original sitting of the test.
- In the case of a missed makeup final test, students must submit a request for a deferral of term work form (<u>https://www.ucalgary.ca/sites/default/files/teams/14/deferral-of-term-work\_weighting.pdf</u>) with section 1 completed. Once the form is received by the instructor, information about a date for a deferred makeup test will be sent within 48 hours; however, students should be aware that this deferred makeup test may not be scheduled until the beginning of the following semester, thus delaying finalizing of their final grade in the course.
