## **Course Description**

This course provides a general introduction to the field of developmental psychology, primarily focusing on prenatal development to early adolescence. Topics will include developmental methodology and theory relevant to biological, cognitive, emotional, and social development.

This course will be asynchronous with pre-recorded lectures. There will be synchronous Zoom office hours once a week. All Zoom office hours are optional and will be recorded and posted to D2L.

#### **Quizzes & Exams**

Quizzes and exams in this course are closed book. The use of resources, including class notes, the textbook, online resources, and calculators is prohibited during the exams in this course. Students may not communicate with others about course material or the exam either in person or electronically during exams.

All quizzes and exams will be available on D2L for a 24 hour window, starting at 10:00am on their scheduled day. The quizzes and exam will be designed to take 50 minutes, but students will be given an extra 25 minutes to account for technical difficulties.

All quizzes and exams will be multiple choice. Questions will appear in random order and there will be no back-button functionality.

## **Course Assignment**

Students will complete one long, semester project that will contain 3 parts. The overall assignment will be to select any topic in developmental psychology controversy and compare how non-scientific sources address controversial developmental topics. Example of topics could be:

- Co-sleeping vs Cry-it-out methods
- Breastfeeding vs Formula
- Screen time
- Whole language vs Phonics
- Free Range vs Structured Play
- Time-outs, Spanking, & Discipline
- Finish Your Plate Parenting
- Child Leashes

## Assignment 1

For Assignment 1, students will submit a reference list of at least 5 sources that they will use for their course project. These will include at least one academic, peer-reviewed research article about the topic, plus 4 non-scientific sources about the same topic (could be online magazine articles, blogs, youtube videos, etc.). Two of the non-scientific articles will need to do a poor job addressing the topic, and 2 do a better or fair job. This will be a one-page assignment in which sources will be listed in bibliographic, APA style. This will be submitted via D2L and worth 5% of the final course grade.

## Assignment 2

For Assignment 2, students will write a brief, 2-page analysis that highlights the findings from their 5 sources. This will be submitted via D2L. This analysis will include a summary of what scientific evidence says about their chosen topic area, along with highlights from the non-scientific sources and a comparison of how the sources' advice matches up. This will be written in APA style and worth 10% of the final course grade.

## Assignment 3

Students will use the key information from Assignment 2 to design an Infographic depicting their chosen Developmental Controversy. This will be an digital poster, PowerPoint slide, or static image file that is submitted via D2L. The infographic will balance color, format, and design with depth, breadth, and accuracy in their chosen topic. The purpose of this infographic will be to explain to non-scientific audiences reliable, evidence based information on their chosen topic.

Late assignments will not be accepted without instructor approval

## Department of Psychology Criteria for Letter Grades

Psychology course instructors use the following criteria when assigning letter grades: A+ grade: *Exceptional Performance*. An A+ grade indicates near perfect performance on multiple choice and short answer exams. For research papers/essays/course projects/presentations, an A+ grade is awarded for exceptional work deserving of special recognition and is therefore not a common grade.

A, A- Range: *Excellent Performance*. Superior understanding of course material. Written work is very strong in terms of critical and original thinking, content, organization, and the expression of ideas, and demonstrates student's thorough knowledge of subject matter.

B Range: *Good Performance*. Above average understanding of course material. Written work shows evidence of critical thinking and attention to organization and editing but could be improved in form and/or content.

C Range: *Satisfactory Performance*. Adequate understanding of course material. Knowledge of basic concepts and terminology is demonstrated. Written work is satisfactory and meets essential requirements but could be improved significantly in form and content. Note: All prerequisites for courses offered by the Faculty of Arts must be met with a minimum grade of C-.

D range: *Marginally meets standards*. Minimal understanding of subject matter. Written work is marginally acceptable and meets basic requirements but requires substantial improvements in form and content. Student has not mastered course material at a level sufficient for advancement into more senior courses in the same or related subjects.

F grade: *Course standards not met.* Inadequate understanding of subject matter. Written work does not meet basic requirements. Student has not demonstrated knowledge of course material at a level sufficient for course credit.

## Absence From A Test/Exam
