Course Description and Goals:

This course provides a general introduction to cognitive psychology – the study of human memory, attention, language processing, and thinking.

Required Text:

Reisberg, D. (2006). Cognition: Exploring the science of the mind.

As part of the course, on-line demonstrations will be presented in class. Access to the website (http://www.wwnorton.com/zaps/) was purchased as part of your text. These demonstrations require that you complete the given experiment by the required date (I will provide these as we approach each experiment) so that I can compile the results and discuss them in class. While not all of the ZAPS are going to be demonstrated, this provides a useful learning tool to experience some of the topics discussed in an interactive way and you are encouraged to complete all the ZAPS for this purpose. Additionally, there is a student website (www.wwnorton.com/web/cognition) that provides useful information and provides some concrete links between cognition and the law. Some of this information I will talk about in class and only the information from the student website that I talked about can be used on the exams.

Evaluation:

There will be three exams in the course. Each exam will include a multiple choice section and a short answer/definition section. *Test #1* will be worth 30%, *Test #2* will be worth 30%, *and Test #3* will be worth 40%. Some text material may not be covered in lecture and some lecture material may not be covered in the text, but both are fair game for the exam.

Reappraisal of Grades

A student who feels that a piece of graded term work (term paper, essay, test, etc.) has been unfairly graded, may have the work re-graded as follows. The student shall discuss the work with the instructor within fifteen days of being notified about the mark or of the item's return to the class. If not satisfied, the student shall immediately take the matter to the Head of the department offering the course, who will arrange for a reassessment of the work within the next fifteen days. The reappraisal of term work may cause the grade to be raised, lowered, or to remain the same.

If the student is not satisfied with the decision and wishes to appeal, the student shall address a letter of appeal to the Dean of the faculty offering the course within fifteen days of the unfavourable decision. In the letter, the student must clearly and fully state the decision being appealed, the grounds for appeal, and the

remedies being sought, along with any special circumstances that warrant an appeal of the reappraisal. The student should include as much written documentation as possible.

Plagiarism and Other Academic Misconduct

Intellectual honesty is the cornerstone of the development and acquisition of knowledge and requires that the contribution of others be acknowledged. Consequently, plagiarism or cheating on any assignment is regarded as an extremely serious academic offense. Plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. A completed Physician/Counselor Statement will be required to confirm absence from a test for health reasons. The student will be required to pay any cost associated with the Physician Counselor Statement.
