Course Description

The purpose of this course is to study the neural basis of behaviour. The structural and functional anatomy of the nervous system will be explored, covering topics that include neuronal communication, nervous system development, research techniques and the scientific method, sensory systems, thought, learning and memory, and neurological disorders.

This is an in-person class held on campus.

Prerequisites

Psychology 200 – Principles of Psychology

Required Text

Assessment Methods

Exams in this course are closed book. The use of resources, including class notes, the textbook, online resources, and calculators is prohibited during the exams in this course. Students may not communicate with others about course material or the exam either in person or electronically during exams.

Exam Procedure:

- Absolutely no electronic devices allowed at your seat or on your person
- Writing implements, ID card, water bottles at desk only
- If a student arrives 15+ minutes late, the student will not be permitted to write the exam and will receive a grade of 0
- All students must stop writing when time is up or their exam will not be marked, receiving a grade of zero
- No student is permitted to leave within last 15 min of exam to limit disruptions

All exams will be multiple choice. Midterms 1 and 2 will be held during regular class time. Only material covered in lecture will be tested. The registrar-scheduled final exam is non-cumulative.

Without instructor approval, late assignments will be penalized 10% per day, including weekends.

The written assignment must be no longer than two pages in length (not including the reference section or title page) and formatted according to APA guidelines. The assignment is worth 5% of the final grade and is **due by 11:00pm on Mar. 28** (handed in via the assignment dropbox in D2L). The student's goal is to find and read a current news article describing research about the brain, and compare it to the original source, as well as relate it back to our discussion of brain and behaviour in the classroom. Further details regarding the assignment will be provided in class and posted on D2L.

Once approved by the course instructor, and at their discretion, alternative arrangements for missed assessments may be considered https://www.ucalgary.ca/pubs/calendar/current/g-1-2.html. Students

may be asked for documentation https://www.ucalgary.ca/pubs/calendar/current/m-1.html. The instructor must be notified within 48 hours of any missed assessment. If the instructor is contacted beyond this 48-hour window, the student will receive a grade of zero on the missed assessment.

Department of Psychology Criteria for Letter Grades

Psychology course instructors use the following criteria when assigning letter grades:

A+ grade: *Exceptional Performance*. An A+ grade indicates near perfect performance on multiple choice and short answer exams. For research papers/essays/course projects/presentations, an A+ grade is awarded for exceptional work deserving of special recognition and is therefore not a common grade.

A, A- Range: Excellent Performance. Superior understanding of course material. Written work is very strong in terms of critical and original thinking, content, organization, and the expression of ideas, and demonstrates student's thorough knowledge of subject matter.

B Range: *Good Performance*. Above average understanding of course material. Written work shows evidence of critical thinking and attention to organization and editing but could be improved in form and/or content.

C Range: Satisfactory Performance. Adequate understanding of course material. Knowledge of basic concepts and terminology is demonstrated. Written work is satisfactory and meets essential requirements but could be improved significantly in form and content. Note: All prerequisites for courses offered by the Faculty of Arts must be met with a minimum grade of C-.

D range: *Marginally meets standards*. Minimal understanding of subject matter. Written work is marginally acceptable and meets basic requirements but requires substantial improvements in form and content. Student has not mastered course material at a level sufficient for advancement into more senior courses in the same or related subjects.

F grade: Course standards not met. Inadequate understanding of subject matter. Written work does not meet basic requirements. Student has not demonstrated knowledge of course material at a level sufficient for course credit.
