Course Description and Goals

This course will provide an overview of the field of *adult* psychopathology, including the classification, etiology (cause), assessment (measurement), treatment, and prognosis (possible outcome) of a variety of psychological disorders. Some of the topics covered will include mood and anxiety disorders, psychophysiological disorders, eating disorders, sexual disorders, substance use disorders, schizophrenia, and personality disorders. A student successfully completing this course will be able to discuss the characteristic symptoms of each disorder, as well as current psychological theories, research, and treatment related to the problem area. The format of the class will be primarily lectures, class discussion, group activities, and brief video clips.

The outlines will highlight **ONLY** the main points of the lectures and are not meant to replace class attendance. Class attendance is essential to obtain full coverage of the subjects.

Evaluation

Students are expected to attend class regularly, to do assigned readings, and to participate in class discussions and group activities. There will be three non-cumulative examinations in the course (75 minutes each). These will include material covered in the textbook as well as the lectures. All examinations will consist of factual and applied multiple choice and short-answer questions. Each exam will be worth 1/3rd of your final grade. Please note that on some topics the lectures will be the only source of information; therefore, regular attendance is important for success in this course. The course notes are provided on Blackboard to assist the student in understanding the material and are **not** intended to replace class attendance. Students having difficulties should approach the course instructor as soon as possible.

University of Calgary Curriculum Objectives

- 1) This course addresses the following course competencies:
 - Critical and creative thinking
 - Analysis of problems
 - Effective oral communication
 - Gathering and organizing information
 - Abstract reasoning and its applications
 - Insight and intuition in generating knowledge
 - Interpretive and assessment skills

With the following course characteristics:

- Considerable class discussion and group activities—students are encouraged to think critically about the course material, raise questions, and present their opinions
- Video clips of individuals suffering from psychological disorders—students are encouraged to identify symptoms and to offer their diagnostic impressions based on their assessment of the symptoms
- A combination of factual and applied test questions
- 2) The course addresses the following curriculum redesign features:
 - A defined interdisciplinary component
 - An international component
 - An experiential learning component relevant to the program objectives
 - Integration of research

With the following course characteristics:

- Discussion of the biological, psychological, and social determinants of psychopathology (biopsychosocial model), making the class multidisciplinary in nature
- Discussion of cultural variations in psychopathology, as well as variations across genders
- Incorporation of class discussion and group activities, allowing students to apply the course material
- Discussion of recent research pertaining to the etiology and treatment of psychological disorders

Reappraisal of Grades

A student who feels that a piece of graded term work (term paper, essay, test, etc.) has been unfairly graded, may have the work re-graded as follows. The student shall discuss the work with the instructor within fifteen days of being notified about the mark or of the item's return to the class. If not satisfied, the student shall immediately take the matter to the Head of the department offering the course, who will arrange for a reassessment of the work within the next fifteen days. The reappraisal of term work may cause the grade to be raised, lowered, or to remain the same.

If the student is not satisfied with the decision and wishes to appeal, the student shall address a letter of appeal to the Dean of the faculty offering the course within fifteen days of the unfavourable decision. In the letter, the student must clearly and fully state the decision being appealed, the grounds for appeal, and the remedies being sought, along with any special circumstances which warrant an appeal of the reappraisal. The student should include as much written documentation as possible.

Plagiarism and Other Academic Misconduct

Intellectual honesty is the cornerstone of the development and acquisition of knowledge and requires that the contribution of others be acknowledged. Consequently, plagiarism or cheating on any assignment is regarded as an extremely serious academic offense. Plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not.
