Course Description

This course is designed to provide students with an in-depth understanding of psychopathology across the lifespan. The course will explore the major psychological diagnoses, their etiology (i.e., developmental origin), characteristics (i.e., signs and symptoms), diagnostic criteria, and approaches to treatments. In addition to gaining knowledge of the prevalence, causes, symptoms, and treatment of mental disorders, students will examine the historical origins of psychopathology to better understand the role of culture in the diagnosis and treatment of mental disorders.

Test (35%) will include all material from June 27 – July 6. Examinations will contain $^{\sim}20$ multiple choice questions and between 3 – 5 short answer questions (ranging from one sentence to one paragraph). This test will be written in-person in class. Exams in this course are closed book. The use of resources, including class notes, the textbook, online resources, and calculators is prohibited during the exams in this course. Students may not communicate with others about course material or the exam either in person or electronically during exams.

Test 2 (35%) For this test, students will be presented with a Clinical Case or Cases. This test will require you to comment on the case(s) in terms of your diagnostic impression. You will be expected to outline a clinical diagnosis and why you have made it. For example, you should speak to what symptoms were evident and how they fit into the clinical diagnosis you come up with and moreover, what other clinical diagnoses you ruled out and why (i.e., state your differential diagnosis if there is one to make, and select your clinical diagnosis and state why). The Clinical Case(s) will also require a response to several multiple-choice questions. More details will be provided in class.

In-Class Knowledge and Skill Building activities (30%) will take place during each regularly scheduled class. These activities will engage students in thought provoking questions which can be answered through TopHat. Overall participation in each day's in-class knowledge and skill building activity will be worth ~2.7%. Full participation is required to achieve the full ~2.7% in any class. If students fail to respond to a question the ~2.7% grade for that day will reflect incomplete participation (-.50% per missed response up to a maximum of 1%). If answers require a correct response, the ~2.7% grade for that day will reflect an incorrect answer (-.50% per wrong answer up to a maximum of 1%). Students

who fail to attend a class and participate without instructor approval for their absence, will receive a 0% for that days in-class knowledge and skill building activities.

Department of Psychology Criteria for Letter Grades

Psychology course instructors use the following criteria when assigning letter grades:

A+ grade: Exceptional Performance. An A+ grade indicates near perfect performance on multiple choice and short answer exams. For research papers/essays/course projects/presentations, an A+ grade is awarded for exceptional work deserving of special recognition and is therefore not a common grade.

A, A- Range: Excellent Performance. Superior understanding of course material. Written work is very strong in terms of critical and original thinking, content, organization, and the expression of ideas, and demonstrates student's thorough knowledge of subject matter.

B Range: *Good Performance*. Above average understanding of course material. Written work shows evidence of critical thinking and attention to organization and editing but could be improved in form and/or content.

C Range: Satisfactory Performance. Adequate understanding of course material. Knowledge of basic concepts and terminology is demonstrated. Written work is satisfactory and meets essential requirements but could be improved significantly in form and content. Note: All prerequisites for courses offered by the Faculty of Arts must be met with a minimum grade of C-.

D range: *Marginally meets standards*. Minimal understanding of subject matter. Written work is marginally acceptable and meets basic requirements but requires substantial improvements in form and content. Student has not mastered course material at a level sufficient for advancement into more senior courses in the same or related subjects.

F grade: *Course standards not met*. Inadequate understanding of subject matter. Written work does not meet basic requirements. Student has not demonstrated knowledge of course material at a level sufficient for course credit.
