Course Description

This course explores abnormal behavior and experiences, their causes and treatment throughout the lifespan (though adult psychopathology will be emphasized). The course will cover assessments, diagnosis, characteristics, and biological and environmental factors affecting major psychological disorders. Psychosocial and pharmacological therapies will also be discussed. Lectures will cover the following modules:



Assessment Methods

Module Quizzes and Learning curves (5% each):

A quiz will be given at the end of each of the seven modules to assess knowledge of the content of that module only. These will be given through the Achieve platform, either as a chapter quiz or as two learning curves. Quizzes will cover the assigned book chapter, be multiple choice, and can be taken up to three times (highest score will be recorded). Each quiz will be worth 5%. Learning curves are a game-like quiz where the goal is to get 300 points. Hints as well as excerpts from the book chapter can be viewed during the assignment (with less points being awarded and therefore taking longer to finish). As the learning curves are graded simply as completed/not completed, each will be worth 2.5% of your grade and therefore two will be given per 'quiz' assignment.

On quiz days, a lecture will be given for the first 20 minutes of class, then the quiz/learning curves will be released at 12:20 and students will have an opportunity to complete it in the remaining class time. If you wish, you may also begin at a later time but it must be completed within the allotted 24-hour time frame – i.e., must be finished and submitted before the 12:20 pm deadline on the due date (no late submissions will be accepted without instructor approval). Please make sure to check that you have access to the Achieve platform before starting quizzes or learning curves.

<u>Midterms (15% each)</u>: There will be two non-cumulative midterms, each covering content from lectures up until the day of the midterms. There will be no lecture on midterm days. The midterms will be released at class time on D2L (i.e., <u>noon</u> on Wednesday February 08, and noon on Wednesday March

22). Students will have 3 hours to complete each midterm exam, within the allotted 24-hour time frame. This means students may begin the exams at any time during the 24-hour window, but will only have 3 hours to complete them. The exams must be finished and submitted before the noon deadline on the due date (no late submissions will be accepted). Midterm exams will be primarily multiple-choice, with a small number of very short answer questions (limited to a few words).

Movie assignment (10%): Students will select a movie from the list below and write a brief review (2 double-spaced pages) from a psychopathological perspective. Students will: 1) briefly summarize the plot, name the character(s) with mental illness, and identify the suspected disorder(s); 2) comment on how accurately the disorder(s) is/are depicted, highlighting correct and incorrect aspects of the portrayal; 3) identify potential biological, social, and/or psychological factors present in the film that may have contributed to the development and/or maintenance of the disorder(s), or speculate on these if they are absent from the movie. Students may make other observations they feel are relevant. The assignment will be further discussed in class in early March. Without instructor approval, late assignments will be penalized 10% per day, including weekends.

Students may choose from the list of movies listed below. These were chosen primarily because they are easily accessible to students though Netflix or library resources, however I recognize that they lack cultural diversity and tend to present a cookie-cutter type view of mental illness. Please contact me if you know of other movies that represent mental illness in broader cultural groups, or if you would like to write your assignment on a movie not listed here.

<u>Final exam (25%)</u>: The final exam will be a mix of multiple-choice, short- and long-answer questions, and cover content from all lectures from the semester (i.e., will be cumulative). This will be a 2-hour inperson exam scheduled by the registrar (time and date TBD, location will be ST 143).

"WHAT WILL BE ON THE EXAM?" Lectures may include content that is not found in the textbook, and similarly the textbook may include sections that are not covered in lectures. Quizzes and learning curves pertain predominantly to the textbook. Midterms and the final will cover material from both the lecture and the textbook. For this reason, it is important that students attend all lectures and follow-up with the TA or instructor if a concept is not well-understood.

"ARE EXAMS OPEN-BOOK?" Quizzes and learning curves on the Achieve platform are open book. The midterms posted on D2L are also open book – <u>however, the final will be closed book due to the inperson nature of the exam.</u> For this course, 'open book' means that the use of class notes is permitted, and use of the textbook is permitted. The use of other online resources is prohibited. Students may not communicate with others about course material or the exam, either in person or electronically, during exams.

"WHAT IF I HAVE QUESTIONS DURING AN EXAM?" The instructor and TA will be available to answer quiz- and exam-related questions via email during business hours only (weekdays, 9:00 am – 5:00 pm). Questions emailed outside those hours will not be answered until the following business day. Thus, for quizzes or exams scheduled on a Friday, students are strongly encouraged to begin sufficiently early to

allow time to reach the instructor or TA with any potential questions before the weekend.

"HOW CAN I ACCESS THE EXAMS?" Quizzes will be released on the Achieve platform – as either a 'practice quiz' or 'learning curve'. Midterms will be released on D2L after class on the dates indicated below. All must be completed and submitted prior to the due date and time listed below.

Department of Psychology Criteria for Letter Grades

Psychology course instructors use the following criteria when assigning letter grades:

A+ grade: Exceptional Performance. An A+ grade indicates near perfect performance on multiple choice and short answer exams. For research papers/essays/course projects/presentations, an A+ grade is awarded for exceptional work deserving of special recognition and is therefore not a common grade.

A, A- Range: Excellent Performance. Superior understanding of course material. Written work is very strong in terms of critical and original thinking, content, organization, and the expression of ideas, and demonstrates student's thorough knowledge of subject matter.

B Range: *Good Performance*. Above average understanding of course material. Written work shows evidence of critical thinking and attention to organization and editing but could be improved in form and/or content.

C Range: Satisfactory Performance. Adequate understanding of course material. Knowledge of basic concepts and terminology is demonstrated. Written work is satisfactory and meets essential requirements but could be improved significantly in form and content. Note: All prerequisites for courses offered by the Faculty of Arts must be met with a minimum grade of C-.

D range: *Marginally meets standards*. Minimal understanding of subject matter. Written work is marginally acceptable and meets basic requirements but requires substantial improvements in form and content. Student has not mastered course material at a level sufficient for advancement into more senior courses in the same or related subjects.

F grade: *Course standards not met*. Inadequate understanding of subject matter. Written work does not meet basic requirements. Student has not demonstrated knowledge of course material at a level sufficient for course credit.

Course Credits for Research Participation (Max 2% of final grade)

Students in most psychology courses are eligible to participate in Departmentally approved research and earn credits toward their final grades. A maximum of two credits (2%) per course, including this course, may be applied to the student's final grade. Students earn 0.5% (0.5 credits) for each full 30 minutes of participation.
