Course Description and Goals

An introduction to qualitative research methods in psychology. We will discuss the theory and practice of qualitative approaches to psychology. A number of approaches will be used to illustrate basic principles but also to provide students with experience in conducting qualitative analysis. Students will develop skills related to conducting research interviews and analysing verbal data. Lectures will focus on theory and analysis; labs will provide an opportunity to practice developing interview materials, conducting interviews, and analysis. Through lab assignments, students will also develop their writing skills.

Evaluation

Final course grades will be based on two course components - (1) Exams (65% of final grade) and (2) Lab assignments (35% of final grade). Details are provided below.

Please note that students must achieve a passing grade on both the class and lab components to pass this course.

(1) Exams (65% of final grade): Four, non-cumulative quizzes with short answer/paragraph answer format and a take-home final exam. The quizzes will be written during the first 75 minutes of class. See the table below for dates, material covered, and weighting of each quiz.

For the take-home final exam, students will write a critical analysis of a journal article. The instructor will provide three articles, and the student will choose one of the three. The criteria for the critical analysis will be provided at the time the exam information is made available. The exam will be handed out during the last class on **December 7.** It is due **Tuesday, December 14 by 4:00 pm** and must be submitted in print form (i.e., typed, not handwritten) either to the instructor in her office or in the green box outside of A275 AND by email to the instructor at the following email address: radtke@ucalgary.ca. Because this is a final exam, no extensions will be granted.

(2) **Lab** (35% of final grade): The labs will involve group work and discussion, although students will be graded individually. Hence, attendance in labs is very important - for yourself and for the members of your group. Also, you must attend the lab in which you are registered to ensure continuity of the group work. Labs begin September 20 and 22.

Lab assignments must be submitted in print form (i.e., emailed copies will not be accepted) either in the lab class or the green box outside of A275 by 4:00 pm on the date the assignment is due. Late lab assignments will be penalized one letter grade per day, e.g., an assignment that is one day late and awarded an A will have the grade reduced to A-. More detailed information on the content of the labs will be provided during the first lab and posted on Blackboard.

The lab grade will be based on 3 lab assignments.

Reappraisal of Grades

A student who feels that a piece of graded term work (e.g., term paper, essay, test) has been unfairly graded, may have the work re-graded as follows. The student shall discuss the work with the instructor within 15 days of being notified about the mark or of the item's return to the class. If not satisfied, the student shall immediately take the matter to the Head of the department offering the course, who will arrange for a reassessment of the work within the next 15 days. The reappraisal of term work may cause the grade to be raised, lowered, or to remain the same. If the student is not satisfied with the decision and wishes to appeal, the student shall address a letter of appeal to the Dean of the faculty offering the course within 15 days of the unfavourable decision. In the letter, the student must clearly and fully state the decision being appealed, the grounds for appeal, and the remedies being sought, along with any special circumstances that warrant an appeal of the reappraisal. The student should include as much written documentation as possible.

Plagiarism and Other Academic Misconduct

Intellectual honesty is the cornerstone of the development and acquisition of knowledge and requires that the contribution of others be acknowledged. Consequently, plagiarism or cheating on any assignment is regarded as an extremely serious academic offense. Plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not. Students should examine sections of the University Calendar that present a Statement of Intellectual honesty and definitions and penalties associated with Plagiarism/Cheating/Other Academic Misconduct.

Academic Accommodation

Absence From A Test/Exam

Makeup tests/exams are NOT an option without an official University medical excuse (see the University Calendar). A completed Physician/Counselor Statement will be required to confirm absence from a test/exam for health reasons; the student will be required to pay any cost associated with this Statement. Students who miss a test/exam have 48 hours to contact the instructor and to schedule a makeup test/exam. Students who do not schedule a makeup test/exam with the instructor within this 48-hour period forfeit the right to a makeup test/exam. At the instructor's discretion, a makeup test/exam may differ significantly (in form and/or content) from a regularly scheduled test/exam. Except in extenuating circumstances (documented by an official University medical excuse), a makeup test/exam must be written within 2 weeks of the missed test/exam.

Course Credits for Research Participation (Max 2% of final grade)

Students in most psychology courses are eligible to participate in Departmentally approved research and earn credits toward their final grades. A maximum of two credits (2%) per course, including this course, may be applied to the student's final grade. Students earn 0.5% (0.5)

credits) for each full 30 minutes of participation. The demand for timeslots may exceed the supply in a given term. Thus, students are not guaranteed that there will be enough studies available to them to meet their credit requirements. Students should seek studies early in the term and should frequently check for open timeslots.
