Course Description

This course provides a advanced and critical investigation into infant, child, adolescent, and emerging adulthood social and personality development, including theoretical accounts, classic and current research findings, and applications and interventions in education, health care, and parenting practices. Topics will be centered around temperament, parenting, peers, and more.

No textbook is assigned to this course. Peer-reviewed journal articles accessed through the library will be assigned as reading and discussion material for each week of the course.

All D2L midterms will begin at 2pm Mountain Time. Students now have a 24 hour period to start a test or timed assessment (until 2pm Mountain Time the next day). Once students start (open) a D2L, they will have 75 minutes to complete the test once it is started within a 24 hour period. Students who have documented accommodations through the Student Accessibility Centre will be permitted to have the length of time determined by their documentation.

Midterms and Exams in this course are closed book. The use of resources, including class notes, the textbook, online resources, and calculators is prohibited during the exams in this course. Students may not communicate with others about course material or the exam either in person or electronically during exams.

Written Essay

Students will prepare a 5-8 page essay which provides a scientific and academic overview to a specific area of social-personality development. The purpose of this essay is to summarize the literature of previous works, no original empirical work is needed. Students will be evaluated based on the breadth and depth of their literature review, APA formatting (Times New Roman size 12, 1-inch margins), grammatical style, clarity of expression, organization, and ability to connect together a body of research. The essay will be submitted via D2L by 11:59pm on the due date.

Magazine Project

Students will prepare a 2 page magazine spread that discusses a specific area of social-personality development (the same area as their written essay). The purpose of this magazine project is to build skills necessary to communicate scholarly academic research to general, non-scientific audiences. Although this will not be in APA style, students should select a font style and size and margin width that is reasonable and easily conveys the information on their topic. Students will be evaluated based on depth and breadth of information, visuals and formatting, interest and engagement with the topic, and real-life applications of their topic area. The magazine project will be submitted via D2L by 11:59pm on the due date.

Late assignments will not be accepted without instructor approval.

Participation

For each of the 8 topic areas in the course, students are expected to contribute at least two discussion prompting questions and at least 3 discussion continuing comments per unit, for a total of 16 questions and 24 comments during the semester. These discussion questions and comments posted to D2L by the end of unit. Students will be evaluated based on their effectiveness of their questions and comments to stimulate discussion.

Department of Psychology Criteria for Letter Grades

Psychology course instructors use the following criteria when assigning letter grades:

A+ grade: *Exceptional Performance*. An A+ grade indicates near perfect performance on multiple choice and short answer exams. For research papers/essays/course projects/presentations, an A+ grade is awarded for exceptional work deserving of special recognition and is therefore not a common grade.

A, A- Range: Excellent Performance. Superior understanding of course material. Written work is very strong in terms of critical and original thinking, content, organization, and the expression of ideas, and demonstrates student's thorough knowledge of subject matter.

B Range: *Good Performance*. Above average understanding of course material. Written work shows evidence of critical thinking and attention to organization and editing but could be improved in form and/or content.

C Range: Satisfactory Performance. Adequate understanding of course material. Knowledge of basic concepts and terminology is demonstrated. Written work is satisfactory and meets essential requirements but could be improved significantly in form and content. Note: All prerequisites for courses offered by the Faculty of Arts must be met with a minimum grade of C-.

D range: *Marginally meets standards*. Minimal understanding of subject matter. Written work is marginally acceptable and meets basic requirements but requires substantial improvements in form and content. Student has not mastered course material at a level sufficient for advancement into more senior courses in the same or related subjects.

F grade: *Course standards not met*. Inadequate understanding of subject matter. Written work does not meet basic requirements. Student has not demonstrated knowledge of course material at a level sufficient for course credit.

Absence From A Test/Exam
