Course Description

This upper-level course is designed to help students deepen their understanding of up-to-date scientific findings which inform our conceptualization of abnormal behavior as it develops in children and adolescents.

The first part of this course will focus on basic concepts in developmental psychopathology. Together, we will look at the basic principles in studying developmental psychopathology, how we classify disorders, and how genes and environment act in concert. Next, we will look at various vulnerabilities and risk factors such as child maltreatment, impulsivity, temperament, stress, exposure to teratogens, brain injury, and emotional dysregulation. In the later part of the course we will begin looking at common disorders. All together, we will cover 11 disorders listed in the lecture schedule below and apply the factors we had been discussing in the first part of the course to the disorders we cover in the second half of the course.

Required Text

There is no required textbook for this course

Assessment for this course will include two midterm exams, a final exam, and a paper. Each of the three exams will include short-answer, long-answer, and multiple-choice questions. The paper will explore your ability to evaluate and communicate research findings as related to a topic in developmental psychopathology. More details will be provided regarding the paper at the start of the course.

Exams in this course are closed book. The use of resources, including class notes, the textbook, online resources, and calculators is prohibited during the exams in this course. Students may not communicate with others about course material or the exam either in person or electronically during exams.

This paper will focus on a specific topic in developmental psychopathology. The paper must be written using APA 7 format and should be no longer than 10-pages (double-spaced, typed, 12-point Times New Roman font, 1-inch margins). Late assignments will be accepted but there will be a penalty of 10% per day (24 hours), including weekends. This assignment will be discussed in more detail during the first week of classes and a longer description of the requirements will be provided.

Department of Psychology Criteria for Letter Grades

Psychology course instructors use the following criteria when assigning letter grades:

A+ grade: *Exceptional Performance*. An A+ grade indicates near perfect performance on multiple choice and short answer exams. For research papers/essays/course projects/presentations, an A+ grade is awarded for exceptional work deserving of special recognition and is therefore not a common grade.

A, A- Range: *Excellent Performance*. Superior understanding of course material. Written work is very strong in terms of critical and original thinking, content, organization, and the expression of ideas, and demonstrates student's thorough knowledge of subject matter.

B Range: *Good Performance*. Above average understanding of course material. Written work shows evidence of critical thinking and attention to organization and editing but could be improved in form and/or content.

C Range: *Satisfactory Performance*. Adequate understanding of course material. Knowledge of basic concepts and terminology is demonstrated. Written work is satisfactory and meets essential requirements but could be improved significantly in form and content. Note: All prerequisites for courses offered by the Faculty of Arts must be met with a minimum grade of C-.

D range: *Marginally meets standards*. Minimal understanding of subject matter. Written work is marginally acceptable and meets basic requirements but requires substantial improvements in form and content. Student has not mastered course material at a level sufficient for advancement into more senior courses in the same or related subjects.

F grade: *Course standards not met*. Inadequate understanding of subject matter. Written work does not meet basic requirements. Student has not demonstrated knowledge of course material at a level sufficient for course credit.

It is at the instructor’s discretion to round off either upward or downward to determine a final grade when the average of term work and final examinations is between two letter grades.

To determine final letter grades, final percentage grades will be rounded up or down to the nearest whole percentage (e.g., 89.5% will be rounded up to 90% = A but 89.4% will be rounded down to 89% = A-).

Absence From A Test/Exam
