Course Description

An examination of the scientific synthesis of evolutionary biology and modern psychology, which offers a novel approach to such issues as short-term and long-term human mating strategies, short-term sexual strategies, conflict between the sexes, parental investment, aggression, and social dominance.

Course Format

Lectures will be taught live via Zoom during each scheduled class as per the course schedule below and will be recorded and posted to D2L after class.

Prerequisites

Psychology 300, 301, and admission to the Psychology major or Honours program.

Required Text

The text for this course *Evolutionary Psychology: The New Science of the Mind* (6th Edition) by David Buss. The text is available in the bookstore.

Assessment Methods

Note: All assignments are to be submitted electronically (via D2L).

1. Multiple choice questions (20%)

You will create 10 multiple choice questions that could be used for an exam in this course. Your questions will test material from chapters 1 and 2 of the text. Details on this assignment will be provided on the first day of class. Your 10 multiple choice questions are due February 10 by 11:59 pm. Assignments submitted after the due date will be penalized 10% per day unless a late submission has been previously approved.

2. Thought papers (40%)

You will write 2 thought papers in this course. You can choose your own topics or you can choose from a list of preapproved topics. Each thought paper is worth 20% of the final grade and each will be between 8-10 pages in length (double-spaced, with 12-point font and 1-inch page margins, including the title page and References page). Additional details will be provided the first day of class. Your first thought paper is due February 26 by 11:59 pm. Your second thought paper is due March 24 by 11:59. Thought papers submitted after these deadlines will be penalized 10% per day unless a late submission has been previously approved.

3. Research paper (40%)

You will write a research paper on a topic of your choice. Papers should be between 15-20 pages, including the title page, abstract page, and References page (double-spaced, with 12-point font and 1-inch page margins). Additional details will be provided the first day of class. Your topic must be approved by March 1. Your research paper is due April 15 by 11:59 pm. Papers submitted after the due date will be penalized 10% per day unless a late submission has been previously approved.

Department of Psychology Criteria for Letter Grades

Psychology course instructors use the following criteria when assigning letter grades:

A+ grade: Exceptional Performance. An A+ grade indicates near perfect performance on multiple choice and short answer exams. For research papers/essays/course projects/presentations, an A+ grade is awarded for exceptional work deserving of special recognition and is therefore not a common grade.

A, A- Range: Excellent Performance. Superior understanding of course material. Written work is very strong in terms of critical and original thinking, content, organization, and the expression of ideas, and demonstrates student's thorough knowledge of subject matter.

B Range: *Good Performance*. Above average understanding of course material. Written work shows evidence of critical thinking and attention to organization and editing but could be improved in form and/or content.

C Range: Satisfactory Performance. Adequate understanding of course material. Knowledge of basic concepts and terminology is demonstrated. Written work is satisfactory and meets essential requirements but could be improved significantly in form and content. Note: All prerequisites for courses offered by the Faculty of Arts must be met with a minimum grade of C-.

D range: *Marginally meets standards*. Minimal understanding of subject matter. Written work is marginally acceptable and meets basic requirements but requires substantial improvements in form and content. Student has not mastered course material at a level sufficient for advancement into more senior courses in the same or related subjects.

F grade: Course standards not met. Inadequate understanding of subject matter. Written work does not meet basic requirements. Student has not demonstrated knowledge of course material at a level sufficient for course credit.

Absence from a Test/Exam

Makeup tests/exams are **NOT** an option without the approval of the instructor. Students who miss a test/exam have 48 hours to contact the instructor to request a makeup test/exam. It is the instructor's discretion if they will allow a make-up exam. Students who do not schedule a makeup test/exam with the instructor within this 48-hour period forfeit the right to a makeup test/exam. At the instructor's discretion, a makeup test/exam may differ significantly (in form and/or content) from a regularly scheduled test/exam. Once approved by the instructor, a makeup test/exam must be written within 2 weeks of the missed test/exam on a day/time scheduled by the instructor.
