Course Description

The aim of the course is to provide insight into the mechanisms whereby drugs exert their action on the central nervous system to influence biochemical, physiological, and behavioural processes.

Course Format

This course will use an asynchronous format. All lectures will be pre-recorded. Recorded lectures and slides will be posted on D2L as stated on the course outline. Other class materials will be posted to the course D2L page by the day/time of each scheduled class as per the course schedule. There will also be a Discussion component on the D2L. Your questions will be discussed in the review lectures.

Quizzes:

There will be 3 quizzes spaced throughout the course; each quiz is worth 5% of your final grade (15% total). Each quiz will consist of 10-15 multiple choice questions. These are designed to test you on the lecture material <u>that has been covered since the last assessment</u> in order to keep you up to date with the course material. The quizzes will be administered online via D2L. Quiz #1 will be on <u>January 27th</u>, Quiz #2 on <u>February 24th</u>, and Quiz #3 on <u>March 31st</u>. They will be posted online <u>at the start of the lecture time</u>. You will have access to the quizzes for 24 hours however, you will have **30 minutes** to complete once started. Without Instructor approval failure to complete quizzes within 24 hours will result in a grade of zero.

Written Assignment:

The written assignment will be worth 10% of your final grade. It should be written in 12-point font, and will require a maximum of 3 double-spaced pages (not including references, or title page). It will be assigned on <u>February 12th</u> and will be due at the beginning of class on <u>March 1st</u>. You will be asked a question that pertains to our in-class discussion of drugs and behaviour, as well as contemporary issues in the field. Further details regarding the assignment, including the grading rubric, will be provided in

class and posted on D2L. <u>All reports are to be handed via Dropbox. Without instructor approval, late</u> <u>assignments will be penalized 10% per day, including weekends.</u>

<u>Exams:</u>

There will be two midterms for this course, each consisting of several short answer questions. Exam questions may be drawn from lectures and any supplementary reading materials that have been provided. Midterm #1 will be held on <u>February 1st</u> and will be worth 25% of your final grade. Midterm #2 will be held on <u>March 15th</u> and will also be worth 25% of your final grade. The final exam will be scheduled by the registrar and is worth 25% of your final grade, it will consist of short answer questions. **Exams will NOT be cumulative.** Exams will be graded such that half marks will be given if it is clear that you know the general answer, but have omitted specific details or scientific terms. Full marks will be given to those that include specifics, and employ the correct terminology and concepts.

All exams will be administered online via D2L. You will have the option to start your exams at a time that best suits your situation within the 24-hour time period. Once you start, you will have **75 minutes** to complete the Midterm Exams and **2 hours** to complete the Final Exam.

Exams in this course are closed book. The use of resources, including class notes, the textbook, online resources, and calculators is prohibited during the exams in this course. Students may not communicate with others about course material or the exam either in person or electronically during exams.

Department of Psychology Criteria for Letter Grades

Psychology course instructors use the following criteria when assigning letter grades: A+ grade: *Exceptional Performance*. An A+ grade indicates near perfect performance on multiple choice and short answer exams. For research papers/essays/course projects/presentations, an A+ grade is awarded for exceptional work deserving of special recognition and is therefore not a common grade.

A, A- Range: *Excellent Performance*. Superior understanding of course material. Written work is very strong in terms of critical and original thinking, content, organization, and the expression of ideas, and demonstrates student's thorough knowledge of subject matter.

B Range: *Good Performance*. Above average understanding of course material. Written work shows evidence of critical thinking and attention to organization and editing but could be improved in form and/or content.

C Range: *Satisfactory Performance*. Adequate understanding of course material. Knowledge of basic concepts and terminology is demonstrated. Written work is satisfactory and meets essential requirements but could be improved significantly in form and content. Note: All prerequisites for courses offered by the Faculty of Arts must be met with a minimum grade of C-.

D range: *Marginally meets standards*. Minimal understanding of subject matter. Written work is marginally acceptable and meets basic requirements but requires substantial improvements in form and content. Student has not mastered course material at a level sufficient for advancement into more senior courses in the same or related subjects.

F grade: *Course standards not met.* Inadequate understanding of subject matter. Written work does not meet basic requirements. Student has not demonstrated knowledge of course material at a level sufficient for course credit.

Absence From A Test/Exam
