Course Description

This course surveys the body of research on traffic safety and driver behavior. Transportation safety is explored through the lens of human factors psychology. Class presentations and discussion are integral parts of this course.

Course Format

This is an in-person class held on campus.

Prerequisites

PSYC 300 and 301 and admission to the Psychology major or Honours program.

Required Text

For each topic in transportation human factors, readings will be assigned. A list of papers will be provided on D2L that can be accessed through the library online. Students are expected to read assigned papers before class.

Assessment Methods

Class Presentations (70% of course grade):

In groups of two or three (depending on class size), groups will present the content of a course reading. Students in their groups will make a presentation once every two weeks throughout the term. Class readings will be assigned to groups every two weeks. Groups will also be reformed every two weeks. Groups should integrate discussion questions into presentations and plan sufficient time to discuss content and issues. Slides from group presentations will be posted to D2L.

All class members will read the course readings for the week prior to class and be prepared to discuss the content and issues. The purpose of presentations and discussion is to critique important methods, results and issues associated with each topic.

A list of course readings will be posted to D2L (also see Tentative Lecture Schedule below). A total of 10 topics will be covered with 3 papers assigned for each topic. A different topic will be covered each week. Students will present 5 papers during the semester (14% for each presentation x = 70%). A rubric for presentation evaluations will be posted to D2L.

Missed presentations will require instructor approval. Once approved by the course instructor, and at their discretion, alternative arrangements for missed assessments may be considered https://www.ucalgary.ca/pubs/calendar/current/g-1-2.html.

Without approval, a 0 will be assigned. With approval, adding the weight of the missed presentation to the next presentation will be considered.

Take Home Exams (30% of course grade):

Take home midterm and final exams will cover the course readings, class presentations and discussions. The format of each take home exam will be essay. Students will have three days to complete each exam. Take home exams will be submitted to a D2L dropbox.

Department of Psychology Criteria for Letter Grades

Psychology course instructors use the following criteria when assigning letter grades:

A+ grade: Exceptional Performance. An A+ grade indicates near perfect performance on multiple choice and short answer exams. For research papers/essays/course projects/presentations, an A+ grade is awarded for exceptional work deserving of special recognition and is therefore not a common grade.

A, A- Range: Excellent Performance. Superior understanding of course material. Written work is very strong in terms of critical and original thinking, content, organization, and the expression of ideas, and demonstrates student's thorough knowledge of subject matter.

B Range: *Good Performance*. Above average understanding of course material. Written work shows evidence of critical thinking and attention to organization and editing but could be improved in form and/or content.

C Range: Satisfactory Performance. Adequate understanding of course material. Knowledge of basic concepts and terminology is demonstrated. Written work is satisfactory and meets essential

requirements but could be improved significantly in form and content. Note: All prerequisites for courses offered by the Faculty of Arts must be met with a minimum grade of C-.

D range: *Marginally meets standards*. Minimal understanding of subject matter. Written work is marginally acceptable and meets basic requirements but requires substantial improvements in form and content. Student has not mastered course material at a level sufficient for advancement into more senior courses in the same or related subjects.

F grade: Course standards not met. Inadequate understanding of subject matter. Written work does not meet basic requirements. Student has not demonstrated knowledge of course material at a level sufficient for course credit.

It is at the instructor's discretion to round off either upward or downward to determine a final grade when the average of term work and final examinations is between two letter grades.
