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Course Description and Goals

There is a large literature in evolutionary psychology that points to sex differences in desired characteristics of partners. For example, men place more importance on physical attractiveness than do women, and women place more importance on social status than men. These differences were observed 20 years ago in a sample of University of Calgary students, and the purpose of this project is to determine if the same differences are observed today. The student will administer a survey using Qualtrics and collect and organize the data. The student will analyze the data with the assistance of the supervisor. Due to time constraints, the student will write a report that focuses only on the Methods and Results of the study. The results will be presented in the supervisor's Evolution and Human Behavior course (PSYC 473) and potentially published at a later time (when combined with the 20-year-old data).

The final report should be no more than 30 pages in length, double—spaced, including tables and figures. The final report will include a brief introduction, but not a traditional literature review. The majority of the report will focus on the Methods and the Results.

Late course components will be penalized 10% per day including weekends.

Second Reader

The second reader (Dr. Susan Boon) will evaluate the final written work (the final report) completed by the student. The student's final grade will be negotiated between the supervisor and the second reader.

Department of Psychology Criteria for Letter Grades

Psychology professors use the following criteria when assigning letter grades:

A+ grade: Exceptional Performance. An A+ grade indicates near perfect performance on multiple choice and short answer exams. For research papers/essays/course projects/presentations, an A+ grade is awarded for exceptional work deserving of special recognition and is therefore not a common grade.

A, A- Range: Excellent Performance. Superior understanding of course material. Written work is very strong in terms of critical and original thinking, content, organization, and the expression of ideas, and demonstrates student's thorough knowledge of subject matter.

B Range: *Good Performance*. Above average understanding of course material. Written work shows evidence of critical thinking and attention to organization and editing but could be improved in form and/or content.

C Range: Satisfactory Performance. Adequate understanding of course material. Knowledge of basic concepts and terminology is demonstrated. Written work is satisfactory and meets essential requirements but could be improved significantly in form and content. Note: All prerequisites for courses offered by the Faculty of Arts must be met with a minimum grade of C-.

D range: *Marginally meets standards*. Minimal understanding of subject matter. Written work is marginally acceptable and meets basic requirements but requires substantial improvements in form and content. Student has not mastered course material at a level sufficient for advancement into more senior courses in the same or related subjects.

F grade: *Course standards not met*. Inadequate understanding of subject matter. Written work does not meet basic requirements. Student has not demonstrated knowledge of course material at a level sufficient for course credit.
