Course Description and Goals

"Nothing in biology makes sense except in the light of evolution" Theodosius Dobzhansky

This course will deal with the ultimate (rather than proximate) explanations of human behaviour. The course material will be presented from the perspective that the behaviour of *Homo sapiens* (like all animals) is the product of their evolutionary history. Converging evidence from a variety of disciplines have led to the framework for this course. First, human nature can be defined as the set of universal, species-typical information processing programs that operate beneath the surface of expressed cultural variability. Second, this collection of cognitive programs evolved in the Pleistocene to solve the adaptive problems regularly faced by our hunter-gatherer ancestors - such as mate selection, language acquisition, co-operation, and sexual infidelity.

Evaluation

The final course grade will be based on: 1) The content and quality of oral presentations (60%), 2) Contribution to the discussion (10%; you are **<u>expected</u>** to ask many good questions of the presenters), and 3) Term Paper (30%; due at the end of term).

- C Poor presentation, no or few contributions, satisfactory paper

Everyone is expected to read every chapter/paper. Presenters should prepare a **45 minute** PowerPoint talk that describes the assigned chapter/paper. Some comment on the background, techniques, significance, good points, failings, etc. are expected from the presenter AND from everyone else (after the presentation is completed).

Term papers (30 pages maximum) are to be on a topic of interest to the student, within the limits of the course focus (evolutionary psychology), on a topic different from the assigned chapter/paper above, and <u>must be approved by the instructor</u>. Late assignments will receive a 10% penalty per day.

Note that it is the student's responsibility to ask the instructor for feedback during the course.

Reappraisal of Grades

A student who feels that a piece of graded term work (term paper, essay, test, etc.) has been unfairly graded, may have the work re-graded as follows. The student shall discuss the work with the instructor within fifteen days of being notified about the mark or of the item's return to the class. If not satisfied, the student shall immediately take the matter to the Head of the department offering the course, who will arrange for a reassessment of the work within the next fifteen days. The reappraisal of term work may cause the grade to be raised, lowered, or to remain the same.

If the student is not satisfied with the decision and wishes to appeal, the student shall address a letter of appeal to the Dean of the faculty offering the course within fifteen days of the unfavourable decision. In the letter, the student must clearly and fully state the decision being appealed, the grounds for appeal, and the remedies being sought, along with any special circumstances that warrant an appeal of the reappraisal. The student should include as much written documentation as possible.

Plagiarism and Other Academic Misconduct

Intellectual honesty is the cornerstone of the development and acquisition of knowledge and requires that the contribution of others be acknowledged. Consequently, plagiarism or cheating on any assignment is regarded as an extremely serious academic offense. Plagiarism involves submitting or presenting work in a course as if it were the student's own work done expressly for that particular course when, in fact, it is not.
