Course Description

This course is required of all honours students and is intended to facilitate completion of the honours thesis and the development of research-related skills. The major goals of the course are to 1) develop your presentation skills, 2) increase your knowledge of the different areas of psychological research, 3) enhance your understanding of how psychological research is conducted, 4) increase your understanding of the ethical issues involved in psychological research, 5) learn about applying for scholarships and graduate programs, and 6) help prepare you for graduate and professional level training.

The fall session will focus on important information related to the honours thesis (e.g. the process of applying for ethics approval), information on graduate scholarships and programs, and instructions on how to prepare a proposal presentation. Each student will deliver a proposal presentation in the fall term (details below). The winter session will include several information workshops (e.g. how to prepare an effective scientific poster, how to write a thesis) and each student will deliver another presentation on their thesis research. Students will also prepare a research poster and secure feedback on that poster from their peers. All students will present their research at the Student Research Conference on April 26, 2024 (date to be confirmed).

Honours Thesis (80% of final grade)

Students will complete a thesis research project under the supervision of a full-time faculty member or an adjunct faculty member. Graduate students may be involved in supervision <u>with oversight by the honours supervisor</u>, but may not formally be considered supervisors or co-supervisors. The thesis must involve original data collection and/or data analysis. Students should clarify supervisor's expectations for the thesis project before the course begins.

The thesis supervisor must arrange a second reader for the student's thesis. If the supervisor is an adjunct member then the second reader must be a full-time faculty member in the Department of Psychology. The supervisor must email the name and email address of the second reader to psycugrd@ucalgary.ca by November 2, 2023.

The completed honours thesis is to be submitted no later than April 9, 2024. Identical copies of the thesis must be submitted to the supervisor, the second reader, and the Psychology Department. To submit your thesis to the Department, email an electronic copy (in PDF format) to psycugrd@ucalgary.ca. Students should consult with their supervisors and second readers to determine whether they prefer to receive a hard or electronic copy of the thesis. Students seeking an extension of the thesis beyond April 9, 2024 must complete an Application for Deferral of Term Work (see the University of Calgary Calendar for regulations).

The thesis will be evaluated on the quality of the written document, calibre of the research project (e.g. originality, appropriateness of method/design, potential impact of the findings, and contribution to the discipline), and research effort (e.g. your contributions to the design/method, data collection, analysis, interpretations, skills/training acquired during the project).

Ethics certification must be in place by February 1, 2024 or the student may be required to withdraw from the honours program due to lack of satisfactory progress. Supervisors are responsible for forwarding appropriate documentation to me (simon.spanswick@ucalgary.ca) on or before this date to demonstrate that ethics certification has been obtained. This is required even in those cases where the student is working on previously approved research.

Well-being schedule (1% of final grade)

One of the goals of the course is to take a holistic approach to ensuring student success. The data shows that effective time management can reduce stress and anxiety as well as increasing well-being. The goal for this assignment is to create a schedule for the upcoming semester that will aid you with time management. Not only should this schedule include your academic deadlines but also time for self-care, etc. This assignment is due via Dropbox on D2L by 11:59pm on September 29, 2023. More details and a rubric will be available on D2L and will be discussed in class.

Fall 3-minute thesis presentation (4% of final grade)

In the fall semester (October 10 to November 9) students will deliver a brief, 3-minute oral PowerPoint presentation that outlines the rationale, goals, and importance of the research they will be conducting for their honours project. These presentations will be graded on the basis of delivery/communication style, engagement, and comprehensibility. More details regarding the presentations will be discussed in class and a rubric will be available on D2L.

Questions and Feedback (2% of final grade in each semester for a total of 4%)

As well as some time after each presentation for questions, students will provide written feedback on the quality of content and delivery of each of their peer's presentations. The goal is to provide students

with extensive feedback such that everyone has a chance to practice and improve their presentation skills. I will collect all of the written feedback and summarize the main points for each presenter. The grade for your questions and feedback will be determined by its quality and your engagement with the material presented by your peers. More details regarding how to provide feedback and grading will be discussed in class and posted on D2L. This same process will occur for the fall and winter presentations.

Well-being reflection (1% of final grade)

The purpose of this assignment is to give you an opportunity to reflect on your fall well-being schedule. In no more than two pages (double-spaced, 12-point New Roman font) briefly discuss what worked, what didn't, and what you might change to aid in your academic success. This assignment is to be handed in via D2L by 11:59pm on February 1, 2024. Time will be devoted to discussing the assignment in class and details and a rubric will be made available on D2L.

Winter Research Presentation (4% of final grade)

Students will give a 12-minute oral presentation (note that this mirrors the time constraints for the undergraduate conference) using PowerPoint. This presentation should outline the entire honours project (including results and interpretation, limitations, and ideas for future research). Each presentation will be followed by a question and answer period. As with the 3-minute thesis presentation feedback will be provided to all presenters. Details regarding the rubric, etc. will be discussed in class.

Research Poster (1% of final grade)

Each student will prepare a poster describing the results of their thesis research. The poster must be submitted electronically via Dropbox on D2L no later than 11:59 pm on March 28, 2024. Is a student has not completed data collection and analysis by that point in time they should base the poster on whatever data have been collected to date (i.e. there must be some data analysis and results discussed even if the analyses presented do not reflect the final results to be reported in the thesis proper). Posters are to be prepared according to the guidelines presented in class on poster presentations to be scheduled in January. More details regarding the posters will be discussed in class and posted on D2L.

Without instructor approval students that fail to hand in their assignments/presentations/posters on the deadlines listed above will receive a grade of zero.

Department of Psychology Criteria for Letter Grades

Psychology course instructors use the following criteria when assigning letter grades:

A+ grade: *Exceptional Performance*. An A+ grade indicates near perfect performance on multiple choice and short answer exams. For research papers/essays/course projects/presentations, an A+ grade is awarded for exceptional work deserving of special recognition and is therefore not a common grade.

A, A- Range: Excellent Performance. Superior understanding of course material. Written work is very strong in terms of critical and original thinking, content, organization, and the expression of ideas, and demonstrates student's thorough knowledge of subject matter.

B Range: *Good Performance*. Above average understanding of course material. Written work shows evidence of critical thinking and attention to organization and editing but could be improved in form and/or content.

C Range: Satisfactory Performance. Adequate understanding of course material. Knowledge of basic concepts and terminology is demonstrated. Written work is satisfactory and meets essential requirements but could be improved significantly in form and content. Note: All prerequisites for courses offered by the Faculty of Arts must be met with a minimum grade of C-.

D range: *Marginally meets standards*. Minimal understanding of subject matter. Written work is marginally acceptable and meets basic requirements but requires substantial improvements in form and content. Student has not mastered course material at a level sufficient for advancement into more senior courses in the same or related subjects.

F grade: *Course standards not met*. Inadequate understanding of subject matter. Written work does not meet basic requirements. Student has not demonstrated knowledge of course material at a level sufficient for course credit.

It is at the instructor's discretion to round off either upward or downward to determine a final grade when the average of term work and final examinations is between two letter grades.
