Course description:	Introductory study of contemporary dance technique. Note that this course will introduce you to fusion and emerging styles within the contemporary dance spectrum as well as offer exposure to African Diaspora movement sensibilities.
Course learning outcomes:	By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to: 1. Recognize the range of styles, diversity of training methods, and the range of movement qualities/expression possible in contemporary dance 2. Move with increased awareness and understanding of the body 3. Demonstrate rudimentary skill in contemporary dance technique 4. Analyze and appreciate dance as an art form through viewings and discussions 5. Demonstrate an expanded knowledge of contemporary dance through various presentations and choreographic studies.
Course schedule:	Will consist of regularly scheduled technique classes designed for continued artistic growth and academic development. Assessment will be ascertained through regular attendance and participation, allowing for close observation of student progress on a weekly basis.
Assessment components:	This is a Pass/Fail course. To achieve a passing grade, you must fully complete all requirements listed below: 1. Attend and participate in all classes. 2. Explore all material deeply and intelligently, and join in class discussions. 3. Fulfill all class assignments and contribute to the collective learning environment. 4. FULL participation is required through the entire class time; you must arrive on time, dressed to dance, having reviewed previous class material. GRADE ASSESSMENT AND ASSIGNMENTS: <u>*In-Studio Attendance and Participation (ONGOING)</u> <u>Value: 25% of Final Grade</u> Students will be assessed on an ongoing basis in each class. <u>HOW</u> you take class and your willingness

Word Doc, 12- point type, Times New Roman font, double-spaced, two (2) paragraphs. Title top and center. Your name, course name, my name and the date in the upper left-hand corner of page. Your reflection should be well-thought out, concise, and draw critical-thinking connections/conclusions about the performance you have experienced, in relationship to studio practice.</p> <p><u>Assignment #4: Final</u> <u>Value: 20% of Final Grade</u> <u>Due Date: The week of December 3rd, 2018. Exact date TBD.</u></p> <p><u>Description:</u> You will learn a choreographed phrase and be adjudicated in the areas of - technical proficiency - performance quality - artistic merit - creativity and creative risk-taking. You will perform it most likely in groups of three (3), in alphabetical order of the class roster.</p>

FOR GRADED DANCE STUDIO COURSES

- A significant part of your grade is based on participation. Participation means not only showing up for class, but also attending to the material at hand with effort and engagement.
- With regard to participation, classes are considered equivalent to assignments. Thus, more than 2 absences per term will have an adverse effect on your final grade.
- If you miss more than one week of classes, your final grade will begin to drop by as much as 10% per missed class.
- If you miss more than two weeks of classes, you have the potential to fail the course.
- If you show up late for or leave early from class, this will be counted as half an absence.
- If for some reason you are feeling unwell during class time, a substitute form of participation may be arranged; however, *you may not obtain this privilege more than once* and you will receive half an absence.
- For studio courses, if you opt out of full participation and choose to sit for a portion of the class, this will be counted as non-participation and will be marked as half an absence.
- Students are responsible for any and all material missed during an absence.
- If you sustain a significant injury during the term that will impact your participation for longer than a week's worth of classes and if this injury is verified by a medical practitioner's note, your case will be submitted to the Dance Division Committee to address your situation.

FOR PASS/FAIL DNCE COURSES

- Due to the experiential nature of this course, classes are equivalent to assignment. Therefore, classes missed will be detrimental to the final grade. More than four (4) missed classes will result in a fail for the course.
- If you show up late for or leave early from class two (2) times, this will be counted as a full class absence.
- If for some reason you are feeling unwell during class time, a substitute form of participation may be arranged; however, *you may not obtain this privilege more than once* and you will receive half an absence.
- For studio courses, if you opt out of full participation and choose to sit for a portion of the class, this will be counted as non-participation and will be marked as half an absence.

Depending on the performance, there is a limited number of seats available for CYS. There is not a guarantee that tickets will be available for all CYS patrons for every performance, based on audience size, demand, etc. 3. CYS tickets are a privilege. If a student receives a ticket to attend a performance, it is expected that they will respect the value of the admission and attend the performance. 4. Process for students: On the date of the performance, from the time the Box Office opens until 15 minutes prior to the performance start time, students should find the UTS staff member with an iPad and show their UCID card to print their CYS ticket. If students arrive after 15 minutes prior to the performance start time, they can also go to the Box Office and purchase a ticket at the student

If students have a course requirement to attend a performance for a specific date, access to the tickets will be communicated by the instructor to University Theatre Services prior to the event. The best guarantee for a free ticket is to arrive early, up to 45 minutes prior to the performance start time. 7. Respect for the Front of House and theatre staff, performers and fellow patrons is an absolute requirement. Failure to comply with this will lead to being asked to leave the venue and could result in the revoking of CYS privileges.
