Prerequisites	Dance 205 and audition or admission to the Dance major.					
Course description	Elementary study of techniques of contemporary dance.					
	The term contemporary dance includes a number of approaches, styles and philosophies toward performance, choreography, and training. The work that you experience in a contemporary dance class or dance concert will vary. Each artist/teacher brings his or her history, artistry, philosophy and methodology. My approach is based on principles of Polish physical theatre, release technique, Gyrokinesis, body-mind centering and contact improvisation. I propose a path toward organic movement; a dynamic exploration and experience of the body in space.					
	This course will focus on developing your foundational skills and artistic abilities as dancers. In addition to artistic presentation, technical skill, and body conditioning, we will be engaging in basic improvisation and creation exercises to expand our understanding of dance and our sensitivity to our own dancing instrument. We will incorporate alternative training and somatic methods such as Gyrokinesis.					

Course learning outcomes	Students will be encouraged to display tangible changes in their approach, to embody a strong work ethic and demonstrate an understanding of how to put concepts discussed or experienced in class into their body, from class to class, week to week.  By the completion of this course, successful students will have:  1. Increased their kinesthetic awareness and attention to movement detail 2. Begun to use momentum, weight and force with efficiency 3. Developed increased spatial clarity 4. Increased their understanding of dynamic alignment and support 5. Become better aware of their anatomical structure 6. Increased their range in qualities of motion and dynamics, producing more readily and easily, specific textures, qualities, and sensations as they move 7. Learned to vary their application of phrasing and musicality 8. Become aware of their individual training needs and built an appropriate warm up and cool down to address their individual readiness needs

Assessment components	1. 40% Skill –ongoing —Technical Proficiency, Clarity, Artistry, and Presentation— The student will be assessed on their technical development in class on an ongoing basis.  Individual meetings on October 19 and 21 during class time to discuss progress.  2. 40% Learning Approach and Participation –ongoing— — Attitude, Commitment, Progress, Ability to Assimilate Information, Attendance— A significant part of the grade will be based on participation. By participating, we mean not only showing up for class, but attending to the material at hand. Effort shows and we will be sure to take note of those fully engaged in the class.  3. 10% Show Attendance – final submission deadline: December 2 2021 All students must attend, live or online: 2 contemporary dance performances (suggestions posted on D2L), as well as 1 drama performance, 1 music performance and 1 art event. If you are unsure of the type or validity of a performance/event, please consult the instructor prior to purchasing your ticket. Once all 5 shows have been attended, ticket stubs or receipts must be submitted in on D2L, along with 150-word reflections within 7 days of each attended event.  4. 10% Final Movement Assignment — Will be presented in class, content discussed in class and detailed on D2L.			
Assessment expectations	Guidelines for Submitting Assignments:  Performance reflections will be submitted on D2L. Final movement assignment is presented in class.  Missed or Late Assignments: Students are expected to submit assignments on or before the due dates specified above. A student should contact their instructor in the event that they are unable			

to complete assignments on time. Late assignments will carry a penalty of 10% per day (or per class in the case of an in-class assignment.)

### **Attendance and Participation Expectations:**

- A significant part of your grade is based on participation. Participation means not
  only showing up for class, but also attending to the material at hand with effort
  and engagement.
- With regard to participation, classes are considered equivalent to assignments.
   Thus, more than 2 absences per term will have an adverse effect on your final grade.
- If you miss more than one week of classes, your final grade will begin to drop by as much as 10% per missed class.
- If you miss more than two weeks of classes, you have the potential to fail the course.
- If you show up late for or leave early from class, this will be counted as half an absence.
- If for some reason you are feeling unwell during class time, a substitute form of participation may be arranged; however, you may not obtain this privilege more than once and you will receive half an absence.
- For studio courses, if you opt out of full participation and choose to sit for a
  portion of the class, this will be counted as non-participation and will be marked
  as half an absence.
- Students are responsible for any and all material missed during an absence.

If you sustain a significant injury during the term that will impact your participation for longer than a week's worth of classes and if this injury is verified by a medical practitioner's note, your case will be submitted to the Dance Division Committee to address your situation.

## Guidelines for Zoom Sessions

Zoom is a video conferencing program that will allow us to meet at specific times for a "live" video conference, so that we can have the opportunity to meet each other virtually and discuss relevant course topics as a learning community.

Zoom links and passwords are only intended for students registered in the course.
