	Description: Students will be evaluated on their skill development and progress
	over the course of the term to ascertain their responsiveness to feedback, and
	determine that they are developing movement patterns and artistry appropriate
	to an elementary level dancer. Students will be assessed on a continual basis in
	class; they will also be videotaped periodically for the purposes of assessing
	technical and skill development. Individual teacher/student sessions at midterm
	will be scheduled to discuss progress.

# Missed or Late Assignments:

Assignments submitted after the specified deadline will be affected by 10% per day. Late submissions beyond 5 days will not be accepted.

#### Attendance and Participation Expectations:

A portion of your grade is based on attendance and participation. Participation means not only showing up for class, but also attending to the material and discussions at hand with effort and engagement. With regard to participation, classes are considered equivalent to assignments. Thus, more than 2 absences per term will have an adverse effect on your final grade. If you miss more than one week of classes, your final grade will begin to drop by as much as 10% per missed class. If you miss more than two weeks of classes, you have the potential to fail the course. If you show up late for or leave early from class, this will be counted as half an absence. If for some reason you are feeling unwell during class time, a substitute form of participation may be arranged; however, you may not obtain this privilege more than once and you will receive half an absence. For studio courses, if you opt out of full participation and choose to sit for a portion of the class, this will be counted as non-participation and will be marked as half an absence. Students are responsible for any and all material missed during an absence. If you sustain a significant injury during the term that will impact your participation for longer than a week's worth of classes and if this injury is verified by a medical practitioner's note, your case will be submitted to the Dance Division Committee to address your situation.
