	<u>Criteria That Must Be Met To Pass</u> Students must attend class and have a basic understanding of 6 step, top rock, popping technique, locking basics, and the basic 36 party dances. Musicality is a huge aspect to the mastery of all dances associated with Hip Hop and Streetdance so some mastery of timing will be expected. 50% of the final grade is based on in class performance.
