Course Description	In-depth study of western modern and contemporary dance theatre practices with particular focus on 20th century to present.		
Course Overview	This course will explore the radically new approaches to theatre dance that emerged in North America and Western Europe at the turn of the 20 th century and will piece together a chronological narrative of their development through to the end of the 20 th century and beyond. We will examine the individual philosophies of seminal choreographers and their unique approach to choreography. We will also take a more thematic approach and explore the cultural and artistic movements from which these individual styles emerged i.e. Modernism, Neo-Romanticism, Naturalism, Abstractionism, Expressionism, Neo-Classicism, and Postmodernism. The course will also cover the skills required to write an effective research paper. Course content will be presented through Adobe Connect Meeting sessions, online lectures, videos/DVD's, and assigned readings.		
Course Learning Outcomes	By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to: 1. Identify the artistic, social, cultural, and political contexts that influenced the seminal developments in the history of theatre dance in the 20 th century. 2. Define, compare, and contrast the major characteristics of Modernism, Neo-Romanticism, Naturalism, Abstractionism, Expressionism, Neo-Classicism, and Postmodernism. 3. Identify the major characteristics of 20 th century modern dance, postmodern dance, and ballet. 4. Name the major figures who influenced and transformed the development of modern dance, postmodern dance, and ballet in the 20 th century; compare and contrast their philosophies and unique approaches to dance-making; and identify their major contributions to the history of dance. 5. Comprehend and extract main ideas from assigned dance history readings. 6. Conduct library research, organize and develop ideas into an effective outline, build main ideas from supporting evidence, and write a coherent, concise paper that is founded on sound grammar, accurate spelling, good word choices and is free of mechanical errors.		

Course Content:

- 9. Contemporary Dance/Ballet: 1990's and beyond

5. Assignment: Research Paper

Value: 55%

Due Date: Monday April 15

Description: This research paper will cover a 20th dance history topic of your choice. It will be between 1,600 and 2,000 words. Steps to the final paper will include submission of:

- 1. Research topic and a preliminary list of research sources: due February 12th.
- 2. Research question: due February 19th.
- 3. A list of references: due February 25th.
- 4. Preliminary thesis statement: due February 27th

5. Outline: due March 14th.

6. Thesis Statement: due March 20th

7. Draft of research paper: April 7th

8. Final paper: due Monday April 15th

These research paper steps will not be graded, but failure to hand in **each one** of the seven assignments leading up to the final paper, by their due date, will negatively affect your final research paper grade.

In addition to the above assignments, students will be responsible for watching all the online lectures posted on D2L, watching the video/DVD material, and completing the course readings.
