Course Description	In-depth study of western modern and contemporary dance theatre practices with		
Course Bescription	particular focus on 20th century to present.		
Course Overview	This course will explore the radically new approaches to theatre dance that emerged in		
Course overview	North America and Western Europe at the turn of the 20 th century and will piece together		
	a chronological narrative of their development through to the end of the 20 th century and		
	beyond. We will examine the individual philosophies of seminal choreographers and their		
	unique approach to choreography. We will also take a more thematic approach and		
	explore the cultural and artistic movements from which these individual styles emerged		
	i.e. Modernism, Neo-Romanticism, Naturalism, Abstractionism, Expressionism, Neo-		
	Classicism, and Postmodernism. The course content will be presented through online

Outcomes	1. Identify the artistic, social, cultural, and political contexts that influenced the		
	seminal developments in the history of theatre dance in the 20 th century.		
	2.Define, compare, and contrast the major characteristics of Modernism, Neo-		
	Romanticism, Naturalism, Abstractionism, Expressionism, Neo-Classicism, and		
	Postmodernism.		
	3. Identify the major characteristics of 20 th century modern dance, postmodern dance,		
	and ballet.		
	4. Name the major figures who influenced and transformed the development of		
	modern dance, postmodern dance, and ballet in the 20 th century; compare and		

contrast their philosophies and unique approaches to dance-making; and identify their major contributions to the history of dance. 5. Comprehend and extract main ideas from assigned dance history readings. 6. Conduct library research, organize and develop ideas into an effective outline, build main ideas from supporting evidence, and write a coherent, concise paper that is founded on sound grammar, accurate spelling, good word choices and is free of mechanical errors. **Course Content:** The following course topics will be covered: 1. Early Modern Romantics 2. The Diaghilev Era 3. **German Expressionists** 4. Modern Dance Pioneers 5. Neo-Classical Ballet 6. **Pioneer Descendants** 7. African American Dance Postmodern Dance: 1960's, 70's & 80's 8. 9. **European Dance Theatre** 10. **Indigenous Dance** 11. Modern/Postmodern /Ballet Fusion: 1990's and beyond 1. Assignment**: Research Paper **Value**: 40% Due Date: Friday April 14 **Description**: This research paper will cover a 20th dance history topic of your choice. It will be between 1,600 and 2,000 words. Steps to the final paper will comprise submission of: 1. Research topic; Research question; List of references: due March 3 2. Outline (including thesis statement); Draft of research paper: due March 31 3. Final paper: due April 14 These research paper steps will not be graded but they are mandatory. If you do not hand in all these assignments leading up to the final paper by their due date, your final paper will not be graded.
