Prerequisites	DNCE 221 (for 321) / DNCE 323 (for 421)
Course description	The course will focus on the fundamental technique of Ballet. Turn out, port de bras, articulation of the feet, épaulement, turns and jumps.  The exercises will be set at the beginning of each month and students are expected to have them memorized by the second week. The instructor will change the exercise each month, focusing on different components of ballet technique.  The instructor will guide the students with:  - Corrections to hone their skills  - Advice to help them apply their knowledge into different realms of the dance industry  - Enforce proper use of technique to dance safely  - History of ballet to better understand where the cultural habits come from.  The instructor may make physical contact to give guidance to the students. If a student is uncomfortable with this, please address this in advance.

Course learning outcomes	By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to:  1. Interpret ballet choreography at a beginner/intermediate level
	2. Use terminology of ballet steps and demonstrate them
	3. Adopt ballet technique to contemporary dance to further improve their skill
	4. Execute basic ballet steps safely through proper understanding of the technique
	5. Observe and recognize the quality of ballet steps
	6. Understand the flow of movement in sequence
	7. Use different dynamics in movement in accordance to the music, direction and texture.
	8. Understand the origins of ballet movements
Course schedule	Each class will have a structure such as:  - Barre exercises  - Center exercises  - Turns  - Jumps  Based on necessity, we will take a deeper dive into certain themes of each
	component.

#### Assessment components

Component 1: Daily class (75%)

Daily classes are the core assessment points for this course. You will be assessed on numerous components.

Attendance: Students are expected to condition themselves to the best of their ability to take as many classes as possible. Ballet is an art form of rigour, discipline, grace and pride. Not only are students expected to be there, they are to come with a sharp mind and heightened attention.

Behaviour: Students are observed throughout the class to assess their attention to detail, respectful and collaborative behaviour, how they carry themselves throughout class and how they respond to corrections.

Technique application: Each correction is meant for every dancer in the room. The students are expected to hear a correction once for them to apply. The students are encouraged to abstract all corrections in their own way to apply to any relatable steps or situations.

Memorization: It is of utmost importance that students build skills to memorize a sequence of steps as quickly as possible. The brain to body connection is optimized by knowing the steps ahead of time to execute the sequence with excellence and to avoid injuries.

Artistry: As creators, students are encouraged to not only execute their steps but also to inject a personal motive to them. The motive will not be given by the instructor. It is each and every student's job to imagine and express at all times.

Musicality: Phrasing, dynamics and rhythm. As the instructor demonstrates the exercise, students are to emulate and expand on it by listening to the music. Students have to be one with the music, not simply following the music.

<u>Component 2:</u> There will be a Ballet class exam (25%) at the end of the term. The instructor will set an etude class that will run without pause and is to be performed like a show.
