Prerequisites	DNCE 235, DNCE 307, and DNCE 333
Course description	This course provides an overview of the approaches to dance pedagogy for
	teaching varied community populations, including adults, seniors, mixed-ability
	and pre-school children etc. Students will engage in reflection, discussion, and a
	variety of practical and written activities as we explore the method and practice of
	teaching dance as an art and educational medium. Students will gain knowledge
	and experience of the teaching and learning process as we examine the dance
	context, the needs of a variety of learners, age-appropriate and genre-specific
	dance content, and instructional methods.
	Students will be required to observe two dance classes (either in person or online)
	outside of the scheduled class time and also make time to meet with a small group
	of classmates to plan their peer teaching practicum.
	This course may not be repeated for credit.
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Course learning outcomes

By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to:

- 1. reflect upon their experiences in dance and articulate through discussion their beliefs and values as dance educators.
- 2. prepare, manage, and monitor dancers and dance facilities to ensure physical health and safety in the dance environment.
- 3. create and maintain supportive and morally safe learning environments; display commitment to psychosocial wellbeing, inclusivity, and diversity in the dance environment.
- 4. distinguish and select suitable dance content when planning lessons for dancers of different ages and with different abilities/disabilities.
- 5. integrate understanding of lifelong motor development and how dance skills are learned when planning and delivering dance classes.
- 6. apply general anatomical and biomechanical principles of alignment when teaching dance to specific populations.
- 7. adapt material and use a range of instructional methods to address individual and group-specific needs.
- 8. analyze, evaluate, report upon, and provide constructive feedback on the appropriateness of content and methods used in one's own and other's dance classes, using dance education language.
- 9. structure and deliver effective and appropriate dance material and activities to enhance dance learning and practice.

Assessment components

Assignment 1: Participation

Students will be provided with regular opportunities partake in discussions, participate in movement and practice-teaching activities, provide feedback to peers, and demonstrate their active engagement with course content through short physical, oral, and written presentations. Assignment 2: Policy Statements

Students will write two 500-word policy statements.

- 5% Safeguarding Policy Statement due by October 1

Assignment 3: Reading Summary, Discussion & Movement Activity

Students will present a summary of one of the assigned readings, develop a discussion topic, and lead the discussion and a related movement activity.

Assignment 4: Dance Class Observation Reports

Students will observe two dance classes for different populations and submit a 750-1000-word written or video-taped oral report for each class.

- 10% Report 1 due by November 4
- 10% Report 2 due by November 4

Assignment 5: Peer Teaching Practicum

Working in small groups, students will choose a dance form and population, develop a detailed lesson plan, and deliver the lesson to their peers.

- 20% Practicum Presentation date TBD
- 10% Lesson Plan due by December 9
