Assessment components

Participation 15%

Attend and fully participate in <u>every class</u>. Be prepared - you must arrive on time, dressed to dance, having reviewed previous class material.

Personal Learning Journal 15%

Due: April 12th, 2017

Description: An art journal collection of weekly notes, observations, reflections, articles, inspirations, quotes, and other relevant materials to show your personality, preferences, and experience. (Minimum 26 dated entries – 2 per week)

Research presentation/discussion 15%

Due: January 18th, 2017 (worth 5%) Due: February 15th, 2017 (worth 5%)

Due: Oral Presentations on March 13th & 15th, 2017 (worth 5%)

Description: Select three dance journal articles investigating aspects of movement education, and write a synopsis of the content (150-200 words). Prepare an oral presentation on one of these articles to discuss the findings with the class (5 minute max).

Field Study 15%

Due: Within 7 days of observing a class

Description: Research, schedule, observe, reflect, and write about your experience as an outside eye for two separate classes, with two separate teachers. (350-500 words for each observation).

Mid-term 15%

Due: March 22nd, 2017

Description: Personal teaching philosophy statement (250-300 words), biography (100 words max), CV, and 10 'Tools' in your toolbox.

Teaching assignments-25%

Due: TBD

Description: Peer and public teaching assignments, including leading warm-up, crafting dance games, choreography, etc.

Details of these teaching assignments will be discussed in class, and distributed on *Desire2Learn*.

Assessment expectations

Presence, Engagement and Participation

Description: It is expected that students attend ALL classes. As the course content is cumulative more than two missed classes will affect your final grade. If you miss more than two weeks of classes, you have the potential to fail the course.

FULL participation is required during the entire class. You are expected to be present, keen and curious. Explore all material deeply and intelligently, and join discussions expressing your understanding of the ideas and concepts presented in class. Please arrive on time, dressed to dance, having reviewed previous class material. Non-participation through any part of class be assessed as ½ an absence (this includes late arrivals or early departures); i.e. 2 such classes are equivalent to a full absence.

Expectations for Writing:

	2. Depending on the performance, there is a limited number of seats available for
	CYS. There is not a guarantee that tickets will be available for all CYS patrons for
	every performance, based on audience size, demand, etc.
	3. CYS tickets are a privilege. If a student receives a ticket to attend a performance, it
	is expected that they will respect the value of the admission and attend the
	performance.
	4. Process for students: On the date of the performance, from 45 minutes prior to 15
	minutes prior to the performance start time, they arrive to the CYS table next to
	the Box Office and show their Unicard. If students arrive after 15 minutes prior to
