 <u>Guidelines for Submitting Assignments</u> Written Assignments should be submitted: by email; in PDF titled with the student's last name and assignment number; Formatted in 12pt, Times New Roman, Double-spaced, with student identification and date in the top left corner. <u>Criteria That Must Be Met To Pass</u> Students must receive a passing grade on the first term and final showings in both performance and choreography, must fulfill their obligation as interpreter to the choreographers by attending all rehearsals and showings, must participate in both evenings of Dance at Night, and must achieve a passing grade on the final paper.
Late Assignments Students are expected to submit assignments on or before the due dates specified above. A student should contact their instructors in the event that they are unable to complete assignments on time. Late assignments will carry a penalty of 10% per day.
 Expectations for Attendance and Participation: FOR GRADED DANCE STUDIO COURSES A significant part of your grade is based on participation. Participation means not only showing up for class, but also attending to the material at hand with effort and engagement. With regard to participation, classes are considered equivalent to assignments. Thus, more than 1 absence during the year will have an adverse effect on your final grade. If you miss more than one week of classes, your final grade will begin to drop by as much as 10% per missed class. If you miss more than two weeks of classes, you have the potential to fail the course. If you show up late for or leave early from class, this will be counted as half an absence. If for some reason you are feeling unwell during class time, a substitute form of participation may be arranged; however, you may not obtain this privilege more than once and you will receive half an absence. For studio courses, if you opt out of full participation and will be marked as half an absence. If you sustain a significant injury during the term that will impact your participation for longer than a week's worth of classes and if this injury is verified by a medical practitioner's note, your case will be submitted to the Dance Division Committee to address your situation.
