	Assignment 1: Somatically-based Solo Value: 25% Due Date: Saturday September 4, 2021 Type: Choreographic Description: Creating and Self-Performing 5-to-8-minute solo based on the somatic information individually collected in class.
	Assignment 2: Process Analysis and Contextualisation Value: 25% Due Date: Monday September 27, 2021 Type: Essay Description: 1500-word analysis of the student's own choreographic process, housed in relevant references to pre-existing research.
