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Course schedule

Each week the instructor will share materials relevant to that week's work. Students are asked to share questions / comments with the instructor who will provide answers relevant to the group (without identifying the source of the question) and individually where necessary. A weekly meeting via Zoom will be scheduled if the group wishes to have one, and scheduling allows for its operation. I am also planning to be on campus and in my office throughout the week for in person meetings where possible.

Assessment components

During the course we will learn by doing. We will work to build, refine and produce a project that is creative, and relevant to your interests. The work from the first three assignments helps us complete the final project in a way that should take the least amount of time for the best possible outcome.

Assignment 1: Building

Assessment Method: Group and individual assessment

Description: creative work begins with a building or exploring stage. In this assignment, students will create a portfolio based on instructions / suggestions in class. Content will focus on the student's work / interests.

Weight: 10%

Due Date: October 4, 2021

Assignment 2: Collaborating

Assessment Method: Group and individual assessment

Description: improving our work as we build, we benefit from suggestions from others. In Collaborating, students will share commentary on portfolios from other students in the class. Commentary will follow a creative approach, where the emphasis is on curiosity (i.e., asking questions) or identifying specific positive aspects in the work that could be expanded. All feedback will be posted to D2L. Detailed instructions provided in class.

Weight: 20%

Due Date: October 18, 2021

Assignment 3: Workshopping

Assessment Method: Group and individual assessment

Description: perhaps the only thing harder than giving feedback is receiving it. Using the comments and questions from other students we will revise our work and update your project on D2L. Detailed instructions provided in class. Marks are based on your ability to address the feedback you receive.

Weight: 20%

Due Date: November 5, 2021

Assignment 4: Producing

Assessment Method: Production

Description: our building, collaborating and workshopping are all done in order to produce something we can share with the world. Using class lessons, group and individual feedback, and reflection on your creative process, students will create a portfolio that represents their work / interests. Grades will be determined based on adaptation during the course, and the potential for the portfolio to serve the student's future work should they decide to continue using the portfolio approach. Creative aspects will be evaluated with an emphasis on their relevance to the student's goals, rather than on a single aesthetic model (i.e., what is creative and useful for someone in Biology might not be the same as that which is creative for a Dance major). Detailed instructions provided in class.

Guidelines for Zoom Sessions

Zoom is a video conferencing program that will allow us to meet at specific times for a "live" video conference, so that we can have the opportunity to meet each other virtually and discuss relevant course topics as a learning community.

To help ensure Zoom sessions are private, do not share the Zoom link or password with others, or on any social media platforms. Zoom links and passwords are only intended for students registered in the course. Zoom recordings and materials presented in Zoom, including any teaching materials, must not be shared, distributed or published without the instructor's permission.

The use of video conferencing programs relies on participants to act ethically, honestly and with integrity; and in accordance with the principles of fairness, good faith, and respect (as per the Code of Conduct).
