Course description	From the economy to the environment and from politics to entertainment,			
	creativity is an endlessly renewable resource that offers benefits for all citizens			
	and may well be the most important human element for our future. Students from			
	all disciplines can investigate the practices and processes of creativity and explore			
	the ways in which it can help enrich their lives.

Course schedule	Material relevant to each week's work are posted to D2L. Questions / comments			
	arising outside class time will be answered in class at the start of each session. In			
	the first half of the semester, we explore the definition of creativity and explore its			
	use in different examples. In the second half, we turn to practical uses of creativity			
	or creative practice in context. Students will share their knowledge in four			
	assignments during the term: two short research papers and two in-class quizzes.
