Description: The journal assignment has two components.

Students will be expected to record daily class activities as well as their reflections on

the work as the ongoing preparation for the final paper.

At the end of term, the student will write a compilation paper based on important discoveries, reflections and development throughout the term.

Although this assignment is worth only 10% of the term, the paper will have significant bearing on both the Participation and Growth and Development grades.

Growth and Development and Participation Assessment

The instructor will be observing and assessing the following:

- 1) Willingness and commitment to move forward in the work
- 2) Discipline, focus, risk taking, working from a growing sense of truth for the actor
- 3) Openness, consistency, preparation, diligence
- 4) Successful integration and application of learned skills

5) Generosity, respect for, and ability to work well with others and overall positive contribution to class discussions, activities and a safe and inclusive environment.

Assessment expectations

Expectations for Writing:
