<b>Course Description</b>	An introduction to performance design and the disciplines within it: scenery, props,
	lighting, costumes and sound. Includes a study of the history of theatre design and
	space. Topics regarding contemporary notions of scenography will be explored, for
	example performance art, ritual, etc.
Course Overview	Distinctions between technical theatre and performance design and production are
	largely artificial, and are all encompassed in the term scenography. This course creates
	a foundation in vocabulary and concepts integral to the study and practice of theatre
	design and technical theatre as a distinct yet closely related disciplines.
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#### **Lecture & Studio:**

Topics include historical and contemporary performance spaces, methods of communication for scenographers to directors and technicians, and topics relating to contemporary scenography questions.

#### **Research and Presentations**

Students will research an assigned scenographer and give a Pecha Kucha style presentation to the class. (10 minutes 20 slides)

# Scenography Assignment (Projects 1 & 2):

Students will have the opportunity to explore a play and its visual and aural world. They will explore techniques of model, drawing, collage, multi-media, sound creation and installation. An innovative approach will be encouraged.

# Course Learning Outcomes

By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to:

- 1. define scenography and its relevant terms (vocabulary) for themselves and understand its importance in the production or creation of theatre.
- 2. analyze a script for its technical and design aspects.
- 3. construct their own knowledge about technical theatre and theatre design, through the execution of paper-projects related to specific script.
- 4. communicate basic design ideas related to a script in a visual way.

# **Bonus Assignment**

#### Description:

Attend a professional production or a Drama Mainstage performance and submit a 3-4 page review of the scenography using the vocabulary from the lectures and readings. **Please Note:**

- Similarly, all the parts of a project, exercise or sketchbook assignment contribute to the evolution and final realization of the work. Therefore, the Instructor(s) may decide not to accept or grade incomplete projects; all parts of each project must be included in the final submission by the given deadline.
- Class exercises, sketchbooks, and projects will be given a letter grade or a grade out of 100 and will be due as noted in the schedule or as specified by the instructor.
- Completed projects, exercises, and/or sketchbooks will be accepted after those due dates, but the grade will be reduced by 10% per day late. In other words, work that is graded as A will receive an F after 6 days late.
