Course description	An introduction to Drama, theatre and performance. Discussing the history, spaces and context of different era's as well as how they connect to our current time.
Course learning outcomes	<ul> <li>By the completion of this course, successful students will be able to:</li> <li>Observe, describe, and analyze key aspects of a live performance.</li> <li>Use discipline-specific vocabulary to discuss theatre.</li> <li>Identify and discuss the roles different theatre makers play in a production.</li> <li>View and discuss theatre from different aesthetics and disciplines.</li> <li>Investigate theatre through an inter-disciplinary lens.</li> </ul>

Course schedule	The course will be divided into 5 modules. Video lectures will be posted every Tuesday – usually 2 to 3 short videos discussing different subjects.

	For the play readings, you will be placed in smaller groups (these groups will change each module) to connect on Zoom (or whatever platform you choose) to read together and come up with a question or through relating to that particular reading.
Assessment components	Five quizzes – 1 per module (the final quiz will also be an overall revue of the semester) these quizzes will be multiple choice and will be taken through D2L. They will cover material shared during the lectures, the plays read, and any additional readings during that module. Quiz dates will be scheduled for the week following the related module.
	<ul> <li>Quiz #1 = 10%,</li> <li>Quiz #2 and #3 – 15%,</li> <li>Quiz 4 = 20%,</li> <li>Final Quiz = 30%</li> <li>Participation = 10% – This grade will be calculated on the completion of the quizzes and based on group self-assessment that will be submitted after each module.</li> </ul>
Assessment expectations	<ul> <li>Every student will have 24 hours to complete each quiz.</li> <li>Any extensions or accommodations needed must be made ahead of the quiz date.</li> <li>Missed quizzes will not be able to be able to be retaken.</li> </ul>

Zoom links and passwords are only intended for students registered in the course. Zoom recordings and materials presented in Zoom, including any teaching materials, must not be shared, distributed or published without the instructor's permission.
