Course schedule The course will be divided into 5 modules. **DATES** Sept 7. Module #1 – Before Greece – Aristotle's Poetics. Sept 21. Module #2 - Oedipus the King, Sophocles October 5. Module #3 - Hamlet, Shakespeare October 28.. Module #4 - A Doll's House, Ibsen November 23. Module #5 – The Amen Corner, James Baldwin Assessment components 1. Four quizzes: 1 = 20% (Oct 7)2 = 20% (Oct 28) 3 = 25% (Nov 23) Final Quiz = 25% (Dec 7) These quizzes (short answer and multiple choice) will be based on the play readings as well as the in-class discussion within a selected module of the course. 2. Play/Performance analysis: The Bus Stop (10%) Length – 500 to 800 words. Students will reflect and analyze one or two elements from the live performance (Direction, aesthetic, design (set, lights, sound), performance, adaptation) and bring in references from past-production through reviews and articles if possible, also attempt to answer the question: Why this play now? A bibliography or works cited is required – citing the production as well – in MLA style. Be clear and concise when organizing your thoughts, large definitive statements/opinions should be avoided unless backed-up with detail within the paper.
