Course description	A continued investigation of fundamental acting principles, continuing with contemporary contexts with an introduction to classical text. Extension and deepening of techniques and approaches introduced in Drama 309.

Course schedule	<p>Warm up to be vocally and physically present – every class meeting</p> <p>Shakespeare Monologue – January</p> <p>Shakespeare Scene – February</p> <p>Contemporary scene of your own choosing – March/April</p>
Assessment components	<p><i>By accepting an offered position in this course, students warrant that they are able and willing to handle the physical and emotional demands of the class.</i></p> <p>1) Participation 10%: includes attendance and constructive contribution to class discussions</p> <p>2) Growth and Development 10%: includes application of self to the process and concepts covered as well as acquisition of skills</p> <p>Detailed handouts will be posted on D2L for each major assignment. There are no formal examinations. Each presentation represents the same opportunity to articulate progress as an examination and are weighted accordingly. Each student will receive a private end of semester assessment interview. The instructor will be observing and assessing in the following areas:</p> <p>A) The students' ability to be responsible for their own learning process</p> <p>B) A willingness and commitment to move forward in the work</p> <p>C) Discipline, focus, risk-taking, consistency, preparation, diligence and organization</p> <p>D) Successful integration and application of the learned material</p> <p>E) Generosity, respect for, and ability to work well with others and overall positive contribution to class discussions and activities</p> <p><u>Assignment 1:</u> Shakespeare Monologue Value: 20% Due Date: February 9, 2022 Type: Presentation Description: You are to present your Shakespeare monologue in class, demonstrating integration of all the acting techniques learned and employing use of Elizabethan devices to engage with character. A detailed text breakdown, based on the in-class investigation of Shakespearean structure in your scene, is to be handed in via Dropbox on D2L [further details on D2L]</p> <p><u>Assignment 2:</u> Shakespeare Scene Value: 25% Due Date: March 21, 2022 Type: Presentation Description: You and a partner are to present a scene from Shakespeare, demonstrating integration of acting techniques and employing use of Elizabethan</p>

A detailed text breakdown, based on the in-class investigation of Shakespearean structure in your scene, is to be handed in via Dropbox on D2L [further details on D2L]</p> <p><u>Assignment 3: Contemporary Scene</u> Value: 25% Due Date: April 11, 2022 Type: Presentation Description: You and a partner are to pick a scene from a contemporary Canadian play, 3-5 minutes in length, integrating all the techniques used over the course. A full textual analysis and script breakdown is to be submitted via the Dropbox on D2L [further details on D2L]</p> <p><u>Assignment 4: Journal and Self Assessment</u> Value: 10% Due Date: April 11, 2022 Type: Written Description: The journal is designed to provide a written record of class activities as well as the opportunity for self-reflection and clear articulation of discoveries within the work. The final journal paper will be a compilation of the term's discoveries and highlights presented in essay form. The instructor will collect both the reflection journal and the final paper on the last day of the semester. The journal needs to be kept separately from course notes.</p>
Assessment expectations	<p><u>Expectations for Attendance and Participation</u> DRAM 312 is an experiential course and attendance is mandatory. Students must be in the space and prepared to begin at the scheduled start of class. Arriving as the class is beginning is unacceptable. The work is collaborative in nature and respect for everyone in the space is required. Lateness and absence, without prior notice to the Instructor, will be reflected in the students' Participation grade. Phone calls and/or emails regarding absences or lates must be made in advance of the start of class and acceptance of excuse or reasoning is up to the discretion of the Instructor. Lateness and /or absence are not tolerated in the profession and will not be here.</p> <p>Acceptance of all excuses is at the discretion of the instructor; prior notice does not always guarantee lenient impact – documentation will be required for any illness that extends into two classes.</p> <p>Clothing that allows you to move is required. No clothing that restricts your ability to fully participate is allowed no jeans, hats, belts, or short skirts. A water bottle is recommended but no food is allowed in the studio [unless for medical reasons] No outdoor shoes in the studio. Be prepared to be barefoot No cellphone use at any time A notebook, pen and pencil are required for each class. <i>Any concerns or issues must be brought to the Instructors attention immediately. Do not muddle through, but arrange to speak with the Instructor, either in person, or through office hours, as soon as possible to seek a resolution to your concerns</i></p> <p><u>Guidelines for Submitting Assignments</u> Students must submit assignments to a Dropbox folder on D2L by the end of business hours on the due date.</p>
