In-Class Tests will require recall of major historical/literary information given in lecture. Several short-answer questions will be asked, in addition to one essay question. Students will have one hour to complete each test. The first three tests will be each weighted at 20%, with the final test (covering only two weeks of class) weighted at 10%.

Students will have wide latitude in selecting the topic of their term paper, but a topic related to the period under study must be selected and approved by the Graduate Teaching Assistant no later than November 15. The final paper will be due no later than the last class of the Session (December 6). Formatting of the paper should conform to the most recent edition of the MLA HANDBOOK FOR WRITERS OF RESEARCH PAPERS.

# **COURSE OVERVIEW**

Drama 345 and 347 are designed to examine the history of European theatre from its origins to its present manifestation in North America and elsewhere. Emphasis will be placed upon the ideas that have helped shape the writing and staging of plays, as well as demonstrating the social impact theatre has had on the cultural development of those societies who have embraced it.
