In-Class Tests will require recall of major historical/literary information given in lecture. Several short-answer questions will be asked, in addition to one essay question. Students will have one hour to complete each test, except for the last test for which a 30-minute time frame will be set. The first three tests will be weighted at 20% each, with the final test (covering only two weeks of class) weighted at 10%.

Students will have wide latitude in selecting the topic of their term paper, but a topic related to the period under study must be selected in consultation with and approved by the Graduate Teaching Assistant no later than March 18. The final paper will be due no later than the last class of the Session (April 10). Formatting of the paper should conform to the most recent edition of the MLA HANDBOOK FOR WRITERS OF RESEARCH PAPERS.
