Assignment 1: Research Presentation

<u>Assessment Method</u>: The grading rubric will be provided by the instructor. Online submission on D2L.

<u>Description:</u> Students will be responsible for a 20-minute presentation on <u>one</u> production featured on the NAC's "Grand Acts of Theatre" (https://nac-cna.ca/en/video/series/grand-acts-of-theatre) and provide an accompanying research outline document. This is a group assignment.

Assignment 2: Article Summary

<u>Description</u>: Students will write a short summary of an article they have read that relates to their research presentation. Articles must be scholarly and from a peer-reviewed source. Papers should be no more than 1000 words.
