Research Paper 2

Description: students will write a twelve-page (excluding references / bibliography) paper based on a topic of their choice related to *John Ware Reimagined*. The essay should contain a thesis statement and use a close reading of the play to develop a coherent argument based on verifiable facts from relevant research sources. All statements must be supported by evidence cited in the paper.

Test 2

Value: 10%

Due Date: April 11 Type: In-class test

Description: in-class test based on material covered throughout the course. Test format will be long form essay based on a question designed to test the student's knowledge of the issues covered in the class.

Seminar

Value: 20%

Due Date: full course

Type: Research-based discussion

Description: To participate effectively in class, students need to read assigned material in advance and come to class prepared to engage in an informed, constructive

discussion of the topic for that day's meeting.
