Assessment components

Assignment 1

Value: 20%

Due Date: Full term

Type: Seminar Participation

Description: There are two distinct components to seminar presentation:

- 1) Early in the term, the instructor will ask students to sign up to lead the discussion of sections from the two books. On the date assigned for those sections, the students who have signed up will be responsible for providing a brief, research-based introduction to the work. They will then suggest key passages from the text that the class should note. Introductions to the reading material should focus on key details in order to appreciate the piece under study. You might think of it as an answer to this question: if this is the only time that the people in this room will ever get to read this book, what should they make sure they know about it? Your introductions should be brief, with the majority of class time devoted to explorations of the work described in the books;
- 2) As a class focused on the study of performance, it is essential that students read the books in advance and contribute to class explorations throughout the term. We will take turns exploring passages from the books and spend significant time exploring what they propose. The instructor realizes some students are more comfortable speaking in front of groups than others, and will work to ensure that people are able to engage in class.

Assignment 2

Value: 20%

Due Date: March 16 in class

Type: Essay

Description: 500-word review developing a formal analysis of a live performance that uses Improv as its primary means of expression. Using citations from the event, you will develop an essay sharing your analysis of the performance. Our emphasis will be on the quality and clarity of ideas, and the way in which those ideas are supported by citations of direct evidence from the performance. Secondary sources will not be

required. Attach your ticket stub to your assignment. Assignments without tickets will not be marked.

We will talk about this in class, but it is the student's responsibility to find, schedule and book the event. Doing so is a required component of the assignment. (The reason I am giving you such a long warning is that what can sometimes happen is that we think we have lots of time to get things done, and we end up leaving things to the last minute. Then, something unexpected happens, and we cannot make it to a show. Doing that would offer an important lesson in scheduling and procrastination, but would not satisfy the requirement for our course, so it would make us both sad.)

Important Notes about this Assignment

- You need to arrange your attendance at a show in advance;
- Attach your ticket stub to your assignment;
- Observe theatre etiquette when attending events as part of our community;
- All theatres provide information about transportation to and from shows.

Assignment 3

Value: 50%

Due Date: Apr 11 in class **Type**: Performance Journal

Description: throughout the term students will maintain a process or performance journal related to our work. There will be opportunities to discuss how such journals work and to check in with the instructor about progress. For each section of the work, students will be expected to record the results of their research in the history, practice and critical implications of Improv.

Test

Value: 10%

Date: Apr 11 in class **Length**: One hour

Details: An essay based test asking students to share their knowledge of the work covered in the class. Students will be given questions to choose from in order to best share their ideas.
