	3. CYS tickets are a privilege. If a student receives a ticket to attend a performance, it is		
	expected that they will respect the value of the admission and attend the performance.		
	4. Process for students: On the date of the performance, from 45 minutes prior to 15 minutes		
	prior to the performance start time, they arrive to the CYS table next to the Box Office and		
	show their Unicard. If students arrive after 15 minutes prior to the performance start time,		
	they can go to the Box Office and purchase a ticket at the student rate. Students should not		
	go to the Box Office unless they are purchasing a ticket.		
	5. If students have a course requirement to attend a performance for a specific date, access to
