DRAM 416 A/B is an experiential course. Attendance is mandatory as your progress and participation are key to the integration of the techniques being learned. Students must be in the space, ready to work, prior to the scheduled start of class, as class will begin on time. Lateness is not tolerated in the profession, and will not be here. Respectful conduct and support of the work of the ensemble is required. Students are encouraged to take advantage of the opportunity afforded by the Instructor's office hours, to clarify the progression of the work and to alleviate any questions they may have about their progress.
